ROME, Oct. 11.—Advices received from Catania show that the recent cyclone was more destructive than was at first supposed. The entire country about Catania is devastated. Vineyards and olive gardens have vanished and fully three thousand dwellings were destroyed.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Oct. 11.—The window glass manufacturers are considering the advisability of closing a portion of their works, as trade is not as satisfactory as two months ago.
