#### THE TOBACCO MARKET.

NO CHANGE IN THE LOCAL MARKET. The Weather Unfavorable for Handling the 84 Crop-The New York, Philadelphia and Other Markets,

and Other Markets.

There is nothing worthy of special note in the condition of the Lancaster market. Sales of 200 cases of '81 leaf and 300 cases of '83 leaf, are reported at fair prices. Doubtless there were other lots sold that have not been reported. To supply the increasing demand for '83 leaf, the remainder of the crop is being sampled. As was the case in the early sampling the crop continues to pan out finely, being free from damage and of good color and quality.

quality.

A little but not much of the 84 crop has been stripped. The weather has been unfavorable for this important part of the grower's work, there having been very little damp weather to moisten the tobacco and permit its being taken from the poles. Some farmers are of course compelled to strip early and throw their goods upon the market to get money for winter use; but where there is no necessity for so doing it is good policy to "make haste slowly." The tobacco is as yet better on the poles than it would in the basement, and there will be plenty of better weather than we have yet been having, to handle it before the buyer will want it. We repeat our advice given last week, to strip carefully, assort conscientiously, place every doubtful wrapper among the seconds and every doubtful second among the fillers, and the result will be that the farmer will get more for his crop than he would by adopting the reverse order of assorting. Fine, clean tobacco is what is now wanted, and it alone will bring high

NEW YORK MARKET
Oscar Hammerstein of the United
States Tobacco Journal contributes as usual an ironical growl at the deplorable condition of the New York market. Here it is: Last week's partial revival of trade was short lived. A relapse has taken place and again our market is suffering from apathy and stagnation. The "dribblet" sales are frequently accompanied by by fault findings and rejections, and alto-gether the market is in a provokingly unpleasant condition. At this season of the year our market generally rejoices in the presence of a large number of ont-of-town buyers. The large Western cities alone used to send quite a contingent. These buyers now hug their firesides finding it pleasant and profitable pastime now and then to relieve a dejected New York drummer of little odds and ends at prices which generally fill the unfortunate employers at home with thoughts of suicide or visions of a lunatic asylum.

New York leaf dealers having a wilderness of idle time about them, frequently make a break in the montony by discussing among themselves the question whether New York as a leaf centre is in a consumptive state or not, and if the waste and decline might or might not be checked by their emigration to a congenial West-ern climate. Certain it is that quite a number of houses have of late opened branches in Western cities and apparently find the venture not wholly profit-able. It must be admitted that as a leaf

centre New York is a miserable failure just now; it will regain its supremacy when it is relieved of its enormous surplus of indifferent tobacces, and when re-plete with good ones. These poor tobac-ces will have to be sold at nominal figures sooner or latter. There is absolutely no help for it, argue as you may. When, several months ago, I predicted the present state of the market it raised a storm indignation. Where are all the wiseacres now ? and where are all the scoffing oldest leaf merchants whose lustre of eminent respectability is, in my estimation, often dimmed by a cloud of eminent stupidity, and, who so loudly declared the statements made by me unsustained by facts. While their calculations were the result of wrestling with statistics accom-panied by commendable perseverence in biting their eminently respectable fluger nails, my calculations were based upon personal invegtigation in stores and factories. And where are the many brothren tories. And where are the many brethren of the country press, who, last spring and summer, blabbed about the splendid outlook, the coming scarcity of tobacco and the authentically reported deterioration in the quality of Sumatra? Why are they so silent now? Why don't they tell the growers that the country is overflowing with poor tobacco, and that owing to the constant influx of Sumatra, good tobaccos. constant influx of Sumatra, good tobaccos can only be sold at limited figures?

Here is a short but nevertheless ex-haustive illustration of the market. When there are buyers, and when there is a sufficiency of wrappers in a lot, goods rule as

thankfully received.
Sumatra again sold heavily; it is estimated that with the stock in warehouse and that in transitu for here, there are about 4,000 bales. The last sale of the season takes place in Amsterdam next week. There will, all in all, probably be another 4,000 bales fit for this market. Altogether, therefore, our market will have a stock of 8,000 bales to draw from the season of t till a new crop is ready-8,000 bales are equal to 32,000 cases of seed wrappers.

The Philadelphia Commercial List reports

The market for leaf does not exhibit the snap usual at this season of the year. Manufacturers and dealers seem to lack confidence in the stability of values. Desirable stock, however, is not likely to go lower, as the supply is too small. There is more doing in '83 Pennsylvania crop, which now holds a leading position

in the market. Seconds are very scarce and wanted. Sumatra is in steady request. Prime high flavored Havana is selling readily at current rates, but other grades are dull. Manufactured tobacco shows gradual improvement in the demand. All regular brands sell fairly and prices rule steady. The cigar trade is mederately active, and manufacturers report a eatisfactory amount of orders coming in.

soming in. WISCONSIN TOBACCO.

In the amount of tobacco grown Wisconsin stands second in the list of eigar leaf growing states, being led only by Pennsylvania, and with the natural increase of the past five years for the coming five, the Badger state promises to rank first in the list. The increase of this industry in the past ten years will prove interesting statistics. The following figures are taken from the reports of the county clerks to the secretary of state as required by law each year :
