REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDING COM MITTEE.

Your superintending committee, to whom was referred the petition of the patrons of Mr. Gates' school, to have said school removed from its present location on Rockland street to the building recently located on Duke street, respectfully submit the following report :

In order to afford the present members of the board a clearer understanding of the reasons why Mr. Gates' secondary school was removed to the Rockland street building, as well as why it should remain there no longer, it will be necessary to go back a few years and trace the history of the school For upwards of twenty years there were but two male secondary schools for the accommodation of the entire city -one on Mulberry street and the other on Duke street.

Duke street. Bix or eight years ago, however, and before the erection of any of our new buildings except the high school and Rockland street buildings, there was a surplus of secondary pupils who were temporarily provided for in Locher's building, Centre Square. A year or two later there was a surplus of pupils for whom there appeared to be no ac-commodation anywhere. The second story of the Rocklaud street build-ing having remained unoccupied from the time of its erection, and needed for no other purpose, to utilize the for no other purpose, to utilize the to your notice, I await your further di-room, and provide additional accomoda-tion, although well understood at the time An examination of the statistical table that it was an improper location, it was determined by the board to remove Mr. Gates' school from Duke street to Rockland street, and organize a new secondary school of lower grade in the building vacated. Since then, however, new buildings have been crected at new points, a re-distribution of pupils have been made, and entire schools removed from one loca tion to another. Our schools have been reorganized from three divisions to two division schools, and our plan of combined schools has been chauged to single room school

Mr. Gates' school as organized when removed to Rockland street has been divided into three distinct schools-one high grade single room secondary, and two low grade secondaries, one of which has been removed to South Prince street, and the other remained in Rockland street,

where it properly belongs. The pupils of Mr. Gates' sebool as at present organized, a single room high grade secondary, came from a large district and parts of the Second and Eighth wards, the majority of whom live in the vicinity of Duke street, while none live convenient to Rockland street, as it is at the extreme eastern limit of the district.

Mr. Ringwalt from the night school committee reported that the colored night school had been closed, owing to the poor attendance of pupils.

Mr. Ochs from the same committee said that the attendance of pupils was never more than 12, and generally a good deal less, though the teacher and committee had done all they could to secure a larger

attendance. On motion the action of the committee

in closing the school was approved. The monthly report of the city superin-tendent was read as follows :

LANCASTER, Pa., Dec. 4. 1884. To the Board of School Directors : GENTLEMEN: The city superintendent submits the following report of the public schools for the month of November. The whole number of pupils enrolled was 277 in the high schools, 1,006 in the secondary, including the Strawberry street school, and 2,055 in the primary, making a total of 3,428, and adding 172 attending the night schools, the entire enrollment was 3,000. The average attendance was 264 in the

The average attendance was 264 in the

high schools, 976 in the secondary, and 1,781 in the primary making a total of 2,971 and adding 128 attending the night schools, the whole number of pupils in average attendance was 3,099. The statistical table accompanying this report will show the enrollment and average attendance in each school, and as far as possible for each teacher.

The average percentage of attendance was 88. The number of visits made by the city superintendent was 106, by direc-

There are now, as near as I am able to ascertain, seven non-resident pupils at-tending our schools. The rules do not seem to make it the duty of anyone to send bills for tuition to their parents or guardians, and yet it seemed to me that i was the intention of the board that they should pay. Having brought this matter

An examination of the statistical table will show that the advanced primary school in charge of Miss Stahl, is cutirely too large, while those in charge of Misses Marshall and Bruning are rather small. The superintendent would most cheerfully recommend the transfer of pupils from Miss Stahl to these teachers, but past experience clearly shows that parants, (instead of regarding such changes in their true light as prompted by a desire

to give their children the best possible advantages by removing them from over-crowded rooms where the teachers cannot do justice to them, to others where there is ample room, and a reasonable number

of pupils to a teacher), invariably protest against such changes, and annoy the members of the board by requests to re-admit their children. The board has now provided ample room in the eastern and orthogona pupiling of the aity and if southern portions of the city, and if pupils suffer in health or instruction beause of overcrowding, the fault rests with their parents who refuse to send them elsewhere. The same thing can, however, not be said of the northern and western parts, to which reference was made in the
