HINTS FOR THE EPICURE

METHODS OF COOKING THE TURKEY,

mow the Unristman Bird to Best Prepared-

Authorities differ in their opinions regarding the best method of preparing the noble bird for roasting, some contending that it should not be stuffed, but simply trussed and thus roasted. There is not that it should not be studed, but simply trussed and thus roasted. There is not any doubt that in this way the pure flavor of the bird being unmixed with any taste which does not belong to it, is better preserved; but then it must be remembered that tastes differ, and that which would be grateful to one palate another would pronounce insipid. All, however, agree on one point—that the bird should be hung at least a week before dressing, if the weather be at all suitable, and they also concede that the hen turkey is to be preferred for the flavor of its flesh. One authority recommends that in its previous management the bird should be emptied and picked a few hours after it is killed and some parings of fresh truffles, (or dried ones if the fresh are not procurable,) placed in the belly, which is then stuffed with clean, sweet hay. The bird is then to be hung by the legs for a week before it is dressed, when the hay is to be withdrawn, the truffle parings washed in withdrawn, the truffle parings washed in warm water and a portion of them stewed in the gravy that is served with the turkey. For the stuffleg, sausage meat

beat together with an egg is supposed to be the proper thing.

Another way is to take a young hen turkey that is perfectly sweet; pluck, draw and singe it carefully, wiping the outside with a damp cloth, and after washing it inside drying it thoroughly. Then make a forcement as follows: Soak a quarter of a pound of day-old Vienna bread in milk, squeeze till dry and add a quarter of a pound of finely chopped sausage meat, two eggs, a tablespoonful each of minced parsely and enion and two ounces of good butter, seasoning with salt, pepper and grated nutmeg. Mix these ingredients thoroughly together; then stuff the bird with the forcement, truss it beat together with an egg is supposed to stuff the bird with the forcement, truss it securely for roasting and put it before a elear fire. It should not be forgotten that basting is all important. When the bird is done enough dish it up, pour over it

some truffle sauce and serve hot. Delie, who holds that the meat of a fowl plainly roasted is more juicy and tastes better than when filled with bread fressing, thus gives directions for prepar ing the bird: Singe, draw and truss a large, tender, dry picked turkey; salt the inside and roast about an hour and a quarter; untruss, place on a dish, surround with water cress; add a little broth to the drippings, strain this over the turkey and serve with cranberry jelly.

None of these methods, however, find full favor in the eyes of the epicure. To him the "truffled turkey" has unrivaled charms, and if he can't have it in this way he would rather forego it altogether. The manner of preparing a truffled turkey it as follows: Take a plump and young

hen turkey, weighing about ten pounds, and let it also be fresh killed. Then select a pound and a half of sound truffles, SUSPENDERS,

washing and cleaning thoroughly to rid of all earthy or gritty substances. Cut a pound of the truffles into balls from an inch to an inch and a half in diameter. and stuff the turkey with this forcemeat. The turkey should hang for at least a week after it is thus stuffed, or even longer would be better if the weather is cold enough. To roast the turkey out a thin pau over the fire, shaking it frequently, for ten minutes; then have dissolved in a half a pint of boiling water two teaspoonfuls of Johnston's fluid beef. Pour this into the pan with the mineed truffles,

seasoning with pepper and salt to taste, and then add a glazz of native sherry. Now set the pan where the contents may simmer gently for fifteen minutes, when, after skimming the fat from the surface, the sauce is ready to serve.

ABOUT THE SUN.

ome Interesting Scientific Facts About the Solar System's Centre. The sun, though immense in size, small in comparison with the solar system over which it reigns. Its surface, as seen through the telescope, is dark at the edges and has a mottled appearance all over, with here and there a large black spot. These spots revolve near the equator once every twenty four days, and a study of them reveals that they are a part of the sun as seen through the clouds which float around it. The apparent surface is an enormous listance from its real surface. The sun is a perfect circle and not flattened at the poles. Spectroscopic analysis of the sun shows some of the tints of the rainbow to be missing, and indicates that the light he sun is intercepted by vapors around it. There are vapors of iron, copper, zinc, bismuth, and many other metals, which are kept in this condition by intense heat

and from the sun's atmosphere.

The sun spots appear and disappear every eleven years. Pictures of the sun have been taken showing metallic clouds flying into the sun spots at the rate of 100 inch to an inch and a half in diameter.
