CLETY MAN'S GLASSES.

As to-morrow will be New Year's day it may be of interest to go back over some of the early customs that marked its observance as a day given up to social jollity in New Fork city. Fifty years ago it was the gay custom for ladies, arrayed in their corneliest, to keep open house, when not only friends and intimates, but formal acquaintances, availed themselves of the opportunity to call in person and pay their devoirs at the shrine of domesticity. These calls were not confined to mere acquaintances, either. Merchants expected their clerks, their foremen and all their employes to pull the bell of courtesy and make the bow of respect on that one day Christmas was not an occasion of general ob servance. It was regarded rather as a religions festiva! than a social day, and by com mon consent old titaers took hold of New Year's day as the one occasion when extremes could meet without offence, and the more rigid rules of etiquette be somewhat relaxed n favor of domestic regard and common courtesy. A piece of cake and a glass of wine marked these calls which were most unlike the "flits" of the present day.

The New Regime.

These good old customs did not survive the march of modern ideas. Each caller began to race with his fellows in the number of calls made, and ladies took to boasting of their well filled list of names. The vulgar rich began to make displays in the table line, and long tables took the place of handsome side boards, and a protentious menu succeeded the modest cake and wine. Little by little, as New York grew, inferior ideas supplanted the oldtime animus, and the purpose of the custom was absolutely switched off into vul-gar programmes. Snobs brought anothery into fashion, and young men rushed about the streets at noon in full evening dress, per-

It being impossible to meet for any length of time, many friends scattered over a large area, cards were invented to fill the want. It is now and has been long considered entirely proper to send cards on New Years's day, and thousands of baskets are hong out every year by ladies who have had all the indis-criminate handshaking they care for, and are quite content to empty a card basket into the fire rather than meet the Toms Dicks and Harry's of their husband's friends, HOW TO DRESS.

Concerning the very important item of dress the following from the New York Herald will be of interest: "If men make calls and women receive them, dress becomes an important consideration. Some men have an idea that "full dress" means a dress coat. So it does in the evening. So it does not in the morning. Nevertheless, hundreds of idiots will call on ladies before the hours of the afternoon are come wearing a garment which can be appropriate in the evening only. Men, be they old or young, should wear a frock coat, with appropriate addenda and gloves such as comport with walking costume. Under no circumstances should they

appear in full evening dress until full evening has made its appearance.
