They had a special meeting of the eastern members of their society in Philadelphia last recenting. William Loeb, vice president Pennsylvania, presiding, and George Hayes, secretary. Join the association.

Resolutions were adopted condemning discriminations against commercial travelers, in favor of theatrical and other professions by hotels and railroads, urging the passage by Congress of the Brewer bill, requesting the railroad companies to issue tickets to members of the association at not more than two cents per mile, &c.

The chairman then appointed the following committees: On railroads—Charles T. Baker, Benjamin Aarons, Leroy G. Archer, W. A. Seitzer. Hotels—George M. Hayes, W. Oliver Craig, J. M. Seidenbach. Press—George M. Hayes, Charles T. Baker, Geo. W. Curtis.

The Brewer bill referred to in the resolutions makes it a misdemeanor, punishable by fine and imprisonment, for any one acting as an officer of a state or municipal corporation to interfere in any way with any commercial raveler, selling goods of any kind, traveling from another state other than the one in which he lives, or in which the manufacturer or merchant does business for whom said traveler is acting. It was stated that a petition for the passage of this bill had received over 100,000 signatures throughout the country.

WHAT THE TRAVELERS AIM AT. The avowed objects of the association are:

"1st. To promote free trade between the several states of the Union.
"2d. To secure a reduction of passenger rates to merchant travelers on all railroads.
"3d. To obtain a fair and equitable allowance of baggage.

"Hh. To secure hotel accomodations com-

mensurate with the prices paid.
"To promote free trade with this associa-"To promote free trade' with this associa-tion means to seen e a repeal of the objec-tionable local and state laws that unconstitu-tionally compel the commercial traveler to pay atax or heense fee in various states and office of the South and Southwest, or aban-don their profession in such localities. "To secure a reduction of passenger rates and to secure an equitable allowance of bag-gage means with us to induce railroad and transportation lines to give the commercial

transportation lines to give the commercial travelers as low rates as are given to theatrig cal companies (who furnish no freight to the railroads), who are allowed excessive bag-gage and transportation at one-third less rates than the business man.

"To secure hotel accommodation commen-

surate with the prices paid' means that hotels shall recognize that the commercial travelers are their regular patrons, and as such are en-titled to accommodations as good as provided tourists or other travelers, and at prices not in excess of reasonable business rates."

WHEAT, OR WINE?

Viniculture Pronounced More Profitable Than Growing Cereals.

The San Francisco Chroniele, the Los Angeles Times, the Sacramento Bee, and other leading journals of California are making active warefare against using the soil of

ing active warefare against using the soil of that state for wheat growing.

The Chronicle says: "According to the ostinate of the state bureau of agriculture, California produced this year 57,000,000 bushels of wheat. Deducting 10 cents per bushel for transportation by rail to market, which will be found to be about the average to the whole state, this crop will not the growers about 45 cents per bushel, or \$25,650,000 for the whole crop. This crop was grown on: an average of about 2,500,000. It is keeping within bounds to say that had this acreage been planted in fruit and grapes it would have yielded from \$250,000,000 to \$400,000,000. The farmers in that case would have realized a farmers in that case would have realized a net profit, after charging up their own labor, their hired help, the cost of plants, manure, etc. of not less than \$200,000,000, whereas it is reasonably certain that the wheat-grower

is reasonably certain that the wheat-grower this year, if he charges himself with his own labor, will find that he has not made a cent. To grow wheat for less than a cent a pound requires exceptionally favorable conditions."

The Los Angeles Times in the same vein raises the query: "Are we not devoting too large a proportion of our rich and fertile lands to wheat-growing, which might much more profitable be devoted to vine and fruit growing."

The Boe says: "An acre of vineyard, anywhere in the state, will yield five tons of grapes, worth \$30 a ton, making a total of \$150, against a total of \$16,80 from a yield of thirty bushels of wheat on the same area of land. The profit on the grain is \$1.80, on the grapes at least \$100. The estimate for grapes is moderate. A single vineyard of 300 acres near Fresno is producing this year about 2,000 tons, worth \$50,200 at \$25 a ton. It would take about 2,500 acres of land, producing thirty bushels to the acre, to raise grain enough to bring that amount this year. What a vast waste of valuable space wheat growing involves in California."
