

The Columbia Herald, under its new editor. Mr. E. J. Miller, of Ridgway, Elk sounty, Pa., made its appearance this morning, and is as bright and spicy as ever. The weekly was sold to Mr. Miller by that jolly, amiable, efficient journalist, W. Hayes Grier, on Jan. 1st, 1885. Mr. Grier was instrumental in establishing the Herald, which paper was brought into existence in 1866, with George Young, jr., and W. Hayes Grier, its publishers. In October, 1874, Mr. Young retired, and was succeeded by S. P. Moderwell, who ontinued with Mr. Grier until Jan. 1st, 1876. Mr. Moderwell then opened a job office on Front sireet, and his place on the Herald was taken by Robert Risk, now on the Lancaster Ecominer. On January 1st, 1878, Mr. Grier became sole owner and editor, and continued so until selling to Mr. Miller,

That Mr. Grier has made the Herald a necess, no one doubts. It was Democratic to the backbone, and is considered by some the leading Democratic weekly organ in central Pennsylvania. Its editors always supported and advocated the cause of the Democracy with untiring energy and marked judgment. To him is due the enviable reputation of the *Herald*. Mr. Miller comes among us not as an instance in concess among us not as an

amateur in newspaper business ; for 15 years he ably edited the Elk Democrat. His

he ality edited the Elk Democrat. His family are now residing on North Second street, beyond Cherry. The *Herald* will continue a Democratic journal, and although having disposed of the paper, Mr. Grier's contributions will often be found in its columns. The family of the old editor will remain in Columbia, as will also Mr. Grier himself, but his time and attention hereafter will be entired, directed to the ereafter will be entirely directed to the duties of his office-superintendent of public printing.





The sheriff has posted bills for the sales of the real estate of C. A. Loeher and Jacob B. Huber, on Saturday, January 17.


Funeral of Frederick Miller.
