NEW RAILROAD APPLIANCES.

The Bush Automatic Safety Car Coupler—A Patent Safety Guard for Engines.

Milton F. Bush, of this county, recently received letters patent for an improved car coupler, which seems to possess unusual merit, as it is automatic in its action and insures perfect safety to the railway employees, who are liable to danger between the cars while the coupling is being made and the cars can be coupled closer than by any other appliance.

Mr. Bush has assigned a portion of his interest to a number of gentlemen in this vicinity, and is now engaged in work which Henry Baumgardner is president. The company will apply for a charter, and have already made arrangements for the manufacture of the couplers, and are taking measures for having them adopted by all the railroads on the railroads. Models of the coupler may be seen at John S. Rohrer's residence, North Queen street, and at the warehouse of Daniel A. Mayers, West Chestnut street.

Safety Guard for Eccentric-Rods of Engines.

Wm. H. Dillinger was granted letters patent on the 1st inst. for a safety guard for eccentric rods of locomotive engines.

Hitherto if the eccentric rods broke or became detached from any cause, the revolving wheels of the locomotive sent them spinning around tearing up the track, and often derailing or wrecking the train. Mr. Dillinger's invention will prevent such accidents.

The inventor claims a combination with the eccentric rods of a locomotive steam engine, of a safety guard so constructed that the rods are allowed free play through the engine, without being supported thereby, but handily secured in position, becoming disengaged from their fastenings; and the guard forms a support for the rods only when they become disengaged from their fastenings.
