The Cold Weather That Broke Upon the West on Monday. Monday was the coldest day of the year in Chicago, the temperature in the morning being 19 degrees below zero. In the Northwest the weather was milder than in the previous twenty-four hours. At Winnipeg. provides twenty-four hours. At Winnipeg, the temperature was is degrees below zero ; Jamestown, is below ; Fargo, if below, and St. Faul, l9 below. A telegram from Cleve-land, says that only the sudden and severe frost prevented another flood in the small rivers in Ohio, as all were rising. The galo of Saturday was terrible.
