IN SUNNY ITALY.

The Fourth of a Series of Lectures Delivered by Rev. Dr. T. G. Apple. A small but intelligent audience greeted

Rev. Dr. T. G. Apple last evening, in the college chapel, to listen to the fourth of a lectures on "Impressions of Europe." The subject of the lecture was Italy. After a few preliminary remarks, he proposed to take his audience to the land of blue and sunny skies, the land of free spirits, the land of classics and of Rome. In vivid colors he portrayed the Alps; one can never forget the impressions made by the first glimpse of these lofty mountains, as you see them like battlements rising up against the skies. The lecturer sketched the cities of Verena and Venice and noted their chief attractions : he dwelt fondly on Florence, its churches, the tomb of Dante and all its art wonders. The way to Rome was traveled and the historical as ociations of the Tiber re-called, and the odes of Horace. The lecture called, and the odes of Horace. The lecture gave a graphic account of the wonders of old Rome, its colliseum and the Appian Way, the scenes of Christian marryrdom and the palaces of the Casars; St. Peter's and the Vatican and all the wonders which make it still a centre of historical and religious interest. Dr. Apple contrasted the real Italian very forcibly with the vagrant type of his race we sae on our streets, and praised the beauty and grace and happiness of the people besuty and grace and happiness of the people of Italy at home. The country has made slow progress as a nation, because of the division of power; but the people lately show

signs of progress.

The secene sky of Italy seems to be especially adapted for the cultivation of the fine arts. With them the characteristic is the taste for the beautiful, so that they live mainly in sentiment and feeling, and people from all quarters of the world come together here to study art in its different forms. As a peo-ple they are free and natural and live in close

ple they are free and natural and live in close unity with one another. An example of their self-sacrince is afforded by King Humbert's devotion to the cholera patients last summer.

Taking all in all, Italy certainly does her full share in contributing for the treasure house of the world. It is true, in diplomacy and public manifestations, England and Germany excel Italy but socially, in art and calture, she sinute on an eminence. Other nations set out ideals of business and power.
