If he who makes two blades of grass where only one grew before is a public bene-factor, how much more so is he who makes winter work on the farm a source of profit, and thus doubles the productive power of the year. The productive power of the west and the cheapness of transportation have made certain crops unprofitable and undesirable to raise. This is especially true of wheat, and of corn and oats as crops to be

The profits of raising beef and mutton have been materially reduced but the value of hay continues and the opportunity to feed cattle and sheep, fitting them for market, has not been destroyed. Here we have a field still open to us of both occupation and profit, but to feed profitably we must guard igainst the inclemency of our climate, for flesh cannot be added in extreme cold or in exposure to the storms of winter. Human abor is employed profitably by providing climate as well as factories to work in, and the length of days is equalized by furnishing

The farmer can guard against the elements with a similar promise of reward if he will, and manufacture his raw material into the marketable article. The dairy cow finds her surroundings more in harmony with her powers of production during the month of June than at any other period of the year. The nearer the farmer duplicates those influences and sur-roundings the more certain he is of su ceess, and the thing is possible; yes, practical, as applied to winter farming. We provide for our families and make our quarters comfort-able; we make our own climate, whatever the weather is out doors; we provide green food, vegetables and fruits for our own health and happiness; we have lengthened the span of human life and quadrupled its ability to accomplish, and we have made it pleasanter to live. What we have done for ourselves we can do for our stock, but what we do we can no for our stock, but what we do

Danger from Diseased Stock. " Farmer " in Oxford Daily.

State Veterinary Surgeon Bridges visited Oxford and Lincoln to investigate the hog disease that has been so fatal to some in this locality. He pronounced it to be common hog cholers, a fact that every farmer should have known when the disease first made its appearance, and by this knowledge have saved the loss of hundreds of our pigs. But none of us knew what it was and to this igno-rance we have sacrificed almost entire one of rance we have sacrificed almost entire one of our largest interests. This, together with other facts that I shall mention, should be sufficient to waken us up to consideration of our condition and some effort for self protec-tion. Dr. Britges says that Hog cholera would not exist in Chester county if no west-ern hogs were brought in, and that this disease is confined to them and those contami-nated by them. We are told that at least four different shipments of infected stock were made to Oxford and vicinity during the past season, that in some the disease mani-fested itself before they left the pens. If this is so the hogs should never have left except by a direct route toward China.

Two hundred and fifty dollars is appro-Two hundred and fifty dollars is appropriated by our legislature towards protecting the interests in stock valued at \$86,000,000. We have but one veterinary state surgeon, and no other authorized inspector of stock. Now in view of these facts and reports, and of our disunited and defenceloss condition as farmers, I suggest that a public meeting be called to see what should or can be done in the way of providing means and remodies for our protection and losses.

Pruning in Winter.

From the Country Gentleman, Hardy trees may be pruned during the latter part of winter, in order to remove needless branches or to give the trees better shape, and after the wounds have dried several days, the cut may be protected from the weather with a coat of common paint, Grafting wax, or a thick solution of shellae in alcohol, answers a good purpose for covering the wounds, but these are not particularly better than paint. It will be observed that by pruning in winter or before growth starts by pruning in winter or before growth starts in spring, the vigor of the tree is not checked; while removing foliage from a tree in sum-mer, more or less retards its growth. Winter Care of Stock.

Winter Care of Stock.

If your cattle or horses are lousy, feed them sulphur in their salt. Be sure they have plenty of salt, and good water in winter; it does not matter how well you feed them; if they do not have plenty of water they will not do well. Have you plenty of gravel so that your fowls get what they want? Have you got your small cattle (one and two-year-olds) separated from the large ones, so they have a fair chance to get their feed? Feed a liberal supply of grain to cattle in winter.
