OUR DON MAKES A SPEECH.

PLEADING THE CAUSE OF AN AMERICAN MERCHANT MARINE.

He Tells the Senate How Much Other Nations Have Done For Their Shipping, and How Little the United States Has Effected in This Direction—Fun in the House.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.

[Senate]—Among the bills passed was one increasing the appropriation for the public building at Pittsburgh to \$1,500,000.

UPON THE CONCLUSION OF CAMERON'S SPEECH HIS RESOLUTION WAS OFFERED TO THE FINANCE COMMITTEE.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—[House.]—When the House met at 10 o'clock in continuation of Saturday's session, Townshend (Illinois) moved to go into committee of the whole for the consideration of the postoffice appropriation bill.

WHITE, (KENTUCKY) ROSE TO A QUESTION OF PRIVILEGE BUT HIS FIRST SENATE CONVINCE THE SPEAKER PRO TEM (BLACKBURN), THAT SUCH A QUESTION WAS NOT PRESENTABLE, AND HE RECALLED HIMSELF TO HIS SEAT.

White continued but the speaker promptly called on the sergeant-at-arms. A deputy proceeded to do his duty, but as he did not carry his emblem of office White refused to recognize him. The deputy asked for his emblem and returned to the White when the latter sat down, but a moment afterward was on his feet again to a matter of personal privilege. He said he wanted to debate the question if the sergeant-at-arms consented without sentence of authority from a member. The speaker then said the action was taken under his direction and refused to hear White further on the subject. "I desire to ask" said Kelley (Penn.) if the person with no insignia of office may place himself on a member's seat and make a speech? The speaker replied "You wish to?" cried several Democrats. The speaker: "the chair hears no appeal." Finally Hammond (Ga.) made a point of order, which was sustained by the chair, that no appeal having been taken, debate was not in order. The House then voted 17 to 17 to go into committee of the whole on the postoffice appropriation bill. Pending going into committee White was again on his feet discussing the subject of a citizen without insignia of office laying violent hands upon him (White). He was making comparisons with Cromwell and the pseudo Parliament at Constantinople when Wise (Va.) objected and called him to order. Hammond repeated his point of order and it was sustained by the chair. White wished that the House should appear in a memorial and present a question of personal privilege but the speaker ruled that the appeal came too late. The House then at 12:50 went into committee of the whole on the postoffice appropriation bill.

MURDER ON A TEXAS RANCH.

Shot Through the Heart Because of Being Too Intimate With His Slayer's Wife.

COLUMBIA, TEXAS, Feb. 9.—A tragic murder occurred on Saturday night at the ranch of A. J. Nathans, ten miles north of here. About twelve o'clock the speaker without disarming approached the door and asked a woman to tell Dudley Henderson to come out. As Henderson appeared the stranger covered him with a revolver and said to several bystanders, "Now scatter, this man is going to move he sent a bullet into Henderson's heart. The stranger then fired four more bullets into Henderson's body, any one of which would have proved fatal, and bidding Mr. Nathans good evening he rode away. He had been too intimate with the slayer's wife.

FOUR KILLED IN A RAILROAD ACCIDENT.

CHRESTON, IA., Feb. 9.—A west-bound train on the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy railroad, struck the bridge trestles from here, yesterday and two coaches and a sleeper containing twenty to twenty-five persons were precipitated into the stream. Three persons were killed and eight or nine badly injured. The names of the killed are Robert Brown, Mount Pleasant, H. M. Crowell, New Albany, Ind., and Mrs. W. C. Powell, San Gaeke, Colo. Later reports say the engine also went down in the general wreck and the engineer was killed at his post.

ENGLISH CAVALRY CHARGE THE MONASTRIE.

LONDON, Feb. 9.—Lord Wolsey telegraphs to the war office today from Korti as follows: "The advance guard of General Earle's column, consisting of a squad of Cavalry, surprised a large body of the Monastrie tribe under Wad Gann, the murderer of Col. Stewart, and charged the encampment and the enemy fled every direction, leaving behind 30 killed, six prisoners, a large number of cattle and camels, and many Remington rifles."

THE ACCUSED DYNAMITERS EXAMINED.

LONDON, Feb. 9.—A large crowd gathered at the County Court, yesterday, to witness the further examination of James Cunningham and Harry Burton. Burton declined counsel, saying he would defend himself. The solicitor for the treasury created a sensation by withdrawing the charge of conspiracy and substituting therein a charge of high treason—insolence against both prisoners jointly.

RAILROAD ROUND HOUSE AND SHOP DESTROYED.

BURLINGTON, Feb. 9.—The round house and machinery shop of the Burlington and Northwestern narrow-gauge railroad was burned yesterday. Engines, comprising nearly all the motive power of the road, were destroyed. The loss is considerable.

FIVE MEN FELL FRY FEET.

HAYVE DE GRACE, Md., Feb. 9.—This morning five workmen, repairing the bridge over the Susquehanna here, were thrown on the ice by the breaking up of the scaffold. The ice was many feet thick and broke through the ice into the river. Two are reported drowned and the three rescued are in a precarious condition.
