These gentlemen came from Pennsylvania to Kansas, and favoring this place decided to locate here. The mill is run by a 50 horse power steam engine, and has the capacity of fifty barrels of flour per day. They have some of the latest improved machinery, such as Barnard & Lee's wheat and corn cleaner, and a new machine they call the indicator, which by turning a crank they can throw the wheat into any bin in the mill. The elevator has a capacity of 60,000 bushels. They ship on an average of fifteen cars per week. Irving On Stage Morals.
From an Interview in Philadelphia Times.

The truth of the matter is that as much conscientiousness is required in actors and actresses to faithfully perform their work as in persons in any other profession, and it would be as unfair to draw inferences from any isolated case as it would be to judge of ne morality of the people of this country by ne declarations of a Mormon convention. It all depends upon what people are, not upon what they do. No fair-minded person any longer supposes that the occupation of any follows can be taken as a guide of their standard of morality. If any such idea could be entertained for an instant no other argument need be offered than the lives of such examples as Charlotte Uushman or Mary Anderson, of Edwin Booth or Joseph Jefferson. No, a woman can be as pure a woman and a man as true a man on the stage as anywhere else, and the many seeming frailties and irregularities of some lives that are so magnified and expetiated upon, no more after this fact than isolated cases after the fact of the morality of the pulpit, the bench, the studio or the family circle.
