Leopold Damrosch, of New York.

Francis A. Drexel, the senior member of the banking firm of Drexel & Co., died Sunday afternoon of pleurisy, at his home No. 1,503 Walmut street, Philadelphia. Mr. Drexel caught a heavy cold two weeks ago, but nothing serious was apprehended until yesterday, when an effusion of water around the heart showed itself, and he became gradually worse until in the afternoon, when he died.

Mr. Drexel had been connected with the banking-house bearing his name since his boyhood. He was most charitable and was a regular contributor to many hospitals, asylums, homes and other institutions, and besides had many individul pensioners in poor families some of whom had been reduced from easy circumstances. Mr. Drexel was a devout Catholic and a regular attendant at the church.

In 1871 he was engaged to take charge of the Arion Singing society of New York and came to America for the first time. While in New York he organized the Oratorio society in 1873, and his Symphony society in 1877. In 1880 Columbia college bestowed upon him the degree of doctor of music.
