All this could have been cut out yesterday. But it was not. What will be the result of this carclessness? When a general thaw occurs the gutters will be in no condition to carry off the water, and pavements and cellars will be flooded. The continued freeze is seciously affecting the oyster interests of the city. The ice prevents the dredgers from working, and when they are idle all other branches suffer. when they are folic all other branches salter. Vessels are frozen up in the rivers of the bay, many of which have not an oyster on board, while those that are now reaching port bring stock from ten days to three weeks old.
