

Fahrenhest ; in the B hole a rod of tekel, that melts at 2,000 degrees; in the C ole a rod of nickel and copper which melts 2,000 degrees; in the C hole a rod of silver which melts at 1,000 degrees and in the F ole a rod of brans which meltant about 1,500 isgrees. The erucible containing these melas will be placed in the retort on the oc-mion of the next cremation and the degree i heat can thus be approximately measured, if none of the metals melt, it will be shown be less than 1,500, whereas if the silver melts it will be shown to be above 1,000; if he copper melts it will be above 2,000, and o on.




