PARM HINTS.

me Suggestions to Owners of Peach Orchards Other Agricultural Topics Illuminated by Late Researches.

From the Country Gentleman.

The fruit buds of the peach are killed by the cold weather through large portions of several states and entirely throughout some. But adverse occurrences may be often turned to advantage, and among them the destruction of the peach buds. In favorable years the trees are often, we may say generally, allowed to overbear. Occasionally the branches are broken with the heavy weight, and always the fruit is much inferior in quality. The over crop exhausts tho vigor of the ity. The over crop exhausts the vigor of the trees, and they are enfectled for years, Nothing, besides good cultivation, can do such trees more good than a year of rest. Owners should take advantage of the opportunity. They need not make the common mistake of shunning the necessary prunin in abundant seasons, because they cannot afford to lop off masses of fruit buds. They can now shorten in the branches and bring the trees into handsome shape. They can thin out small side-shoots wherever they are growing too thickly. They will understand that this work is to be done early in spring

that this work is to be done early in spring before the buds open, although the peach suffers less than zome other fruit trees if the pruning happens to be done two or three days after the swelling of the buds.

Peach crehards require the application of yard manure much less than most other fruit trees; yet if the soil is quite poor and the trees have been stunted by overbearing in previous years, a thin top-dressing over the whole surface will impart vigor to the shoots and a darker green to the leaves. On most soils a top-dressing of ashes is a positive benefit. Superphosphate is also beneficial on many kinds of soil. But generally pothing is many kinds of soil. But generally pothing is equal to clean, mellow, shallow cultivation. Whatever the soil, treatment and growth, the trees should not be crowded together, If freedom from rot would be avoided, and fine, ruddy, well ripened and delicious fruit is an object. Some planters place the trees twenty feet apart for this reason; but this distance is not necessary if the branches are regularly shortened in, and the trees kept in a sufficiently compact and symmetrical form. Now that there is little lear of interfering with the crop, the trees may be brought into the best shape.

Vitality of Buried Seed. It is well known that seeds buried so deep In the soil as to be entirely beyond the reach of atmospheric influences, will remain dormant a long time, but just how long has not been determined. A writer in the London Garden gives an interesting instance of long Garden gives an interesting instance of long vitality. Some fifty years ago, a bed was made of peat soil for planting rhododendrons, brought from an adjacent locality. Last year these old rhododendrons were grubbed up, to be replaced with new and better soris. The old peat soil was turned over, the bottom portion being brought to the surface. Foxgloves grew abundantly on the places where the peat was originally obtained; and last season the newly planted places where the peat was originally ob-tained; and last season the newly planted bed was covered with a thick crop of seed-ling foxgloves. We have witnessed some less striking cases. An old pasture was plowed deeply in spring, and allowed to re-main as summer followed, in which condi-tion it became covered with a dense growth of foxtail grass. Another pasture, on being similarly plowed in a subsequent year, gave a full crop of pig-weeds. The time during which these fields had remained in pasture was not known, but it was at least several years. Some ignorant persons absurdly insisted that these weeds came up spontaneously without seeds. Had the foxglove and other seeds remained above ground, they would have much sooner lost their vitality

Planting Peach Stones. Samuel Miller says that peach stones spread on the ground two inches thick, before winter, and covered about the same thickness with mellow soil, will keep well through winter; and in spring those which do not open and sprout, may be cracked and put into shallow boxes of earth or sawdust, the latter preferable, and covered one inch. He says they will come up as thick as the hair on a dog's back, and when an inch or two high may be set out in rows three or four inches apart, the rows three feet asunder.

Cultivation and Drouth. Robert Johnston gives an illustration of the value of a mellow and cultivated soil for preserving moisture in drouth. A portion of his ground was full of weed seeds, and to give he strawberries and vegetables a fair chance he had to keep up a constant cultivation. The season was very dry; and so great was the contrast between this portion of his gar-den and the rest, that persons who passed and saw the difference, would hardly believe that it was not in consequence of the mellow and cultivated portion being wa-tered, although no water was given to it. Sprouting Hickory Nuts.

A Vermont paper describes the manner by which hickory nuts which had been drying all winter, were made to grow. Under ordinary treatment the young sprout would never reach the outside of the dried and har-dened shell. Each nut was placed in a vic-and the screw cautiously turned till the shell was heard to crack—but not breaking open— then dropped into water three or four days, and planted in mellow soil; and most of

Peach Grub. Prof. Cook thinks that the kerosene and

cap mixture, placed under ground and close to the tree, will kill the peach grub; but he states that carbolic acid and soap will cer-tainly do it. Ashes will not prevent the laying of the eggs. The course which we have for many years adopted is to examine the trees in spring, and again early in autuum, remove the earth where the exudation shows their presence, and follow them with the point of the knife to the end of their burrows, where they are destroyed at once. On the whole, we have found this the easiest and surest way, an active hand clearing several hundred trees
