An Important Hotel Decision.

In the superior civil court at Boston Monday, in a suit of a Miss Marie, of New York, against the proprietor of the Hotel Vendome, the jury rendered a verdict for defendant. The action was to recover \$4,000, the value of a clock which was stolen from the plaintiff while a guest at the defendant's hotel in May, 1884. It appeared in the evidence that the property was locked in a trunk which was placed in the room, and was stolen during her absence, the door of the room being unlocked as there was no key.

The ruling in this case, which is posted in the plaintiff's room, required that guests on leaving their rooms should leave the keys with the clerk at the office, and that the landlord would not be responsible for valuables lost or stolen unless given in charge of the clerk. Judge Knowlton in charging the jury said: "It is found that the negligence of the plaintiff contributed to the loss, she could not in any event recover.
