

FROM SLAVES.

Many people, writes a lady correspondent from Newark, were deceived by optical illusions. On a recent morning I looked into my brother's room, and saw him standing at his dressing-table. Then I remembered that I had been to do my duty, and I said to myself, 'That is an optical illusion.' Knowing that it was such, I looked at the figure until it slowly faded away. Let me add that I am in good bodily health, cheerful, and I believe sound in mind. A friend who died lately said in her last hours, when apparently she was rational, that she saw her dead parents and brother in her room. She exclaimed, addressing the friends who stood at her bedside, 'There they are, right there, as you see them. I repeat, I repeat, as far as any one could judge, she was thoroughly conscious. But we will pass over her case, for it is not exceptional and while we cannot say she was delirious, neither can we affirm positively that she had her senses. While bending over her husband shortly before his death she observed, to the surprise of all, that his face was changing, and the next moment saw there, instead of the face of her dead brother. The two men were entirely unlike in appearance. One was tall, thin, and had a high forehead, and the other very dark. Shortly afterwards the lady saw on her husband's face the features of another dear friend, and a little later that of a third. Her morbid and overwrought fancy deceived her, some one says. Could two persons be deceived at the same time in the same way? I asked this because three years ago this lady and her sister watched beside the dying father of the late Mrs. M. and suddenly changed. One of the ladies saw the other observed this, and said: 'Emmily, who was it?' 'Adelaide,' was the answer. 'Yes, Adelaide. 'The two ladies have told me that they saw unmistakably the face of their dead cousin, a woman, shining out through the face of the dying child. I offer no explanation of these phenomena, and present them only because to me they seem very interesting.'

Catholic Coal Miners Club a Clergyman. Rev. They discovered the house on fire, but before they could reach it the children were burned to death.

Killed While Returning from Court. Edward P. East, a prominent farmer of Ansonia county, while walking home from the trial of the York, Philadelphia & Norfolk railroad, was run over by an express train on Onancock and killed Monday night. His body was found Tuesday morning, and was buried on Tuesday. Both arms were severed from the body and one leg was picked up a hundred yards from where the accident occurred. The deceased attended the county court Onancock, and was returning home when he was killed.

Slight Fire at a Pottery. At 12 o'clock the morning Officer Heiss struck an alarm from box 21, corner of West King and Charlotte streets, to which the fire department responded promptly. Their services were not required, however, as the fire was extinguished by the fire engine. The fire was at the pottery of Daniel Swops, No. 34 North May street. During the day crocks were burned, and it is supposed the fire originated from the embers. The only damage done was a few boards destroyed at the kiln.
