

They found the door locked and smoke issuing from the windows. The door was broken down, and rushing in, they found the room in flames. After the fire was ex-tinguished they beheld a shocking sight. In a corner of the room were the charred re-mains of Mrs. Spring and her two children. A bedstead formerly occupied the corner in which the remains were found. The bed-stead had been entirely consumed. Kero-sene oil was found liberally scattered over the furniture and floor. 
