Brief Treever Salars, Mr. Geo. W. Paimer has made a successful experiment in mining bright tobacco in South-western Virginia. On his farm in Smyth county he raised in 1886 forty-nine thousand pounds of yellow tobacco, which he sold in Lynchburg at a sverage of \$22.75 per hundred pounds, realising over \$11,000 for his crop. This year his crop now in bis barn will reach 60,000 pounds, and he is arranging to plant this spring for a crop of about 400,000 hills, or 80 acres.
