Henry, Schweers Becomes Melaucholy, Seeks Blow His Head Off With a Gun And Nearly Succeeds-A Would-be Suicide (at the Prison Detected.

Yesterday afternoon Henry Schweers, German, aged 29 years, who resides with his mother on Christian street, near Woodward, attempted suicide at his home. The family missed him during the afternoon and sup-posed that he had gone away. Between 4 and 5 o'clock he came walking down stairs. He was bleeding from the mouth, nose and ears, and the family thought he had a hemorrhage. He stated that he had shot himself, while

ears, and the family thought he had a hemorrhage. He stated that he had shot himself, while up in the garret, with the intention of taking his life and it would be impossible for them to save him. After speaking a few words the injured man fell upon the floor. Dr. Withers was sent for to attend him. Upon examination it was found that a number of shot were lodged in the man's throat and neck, and the inside of his mouth was terribly burned by powder. The weapon used by Schweers was a double-barrelled gun and the load was probably small. This morning he was taken to the hospital and is in a critical condition.

Schweers has been in this country about six years. He had been employed as a helper at the Penn iron works, but was obliged to stop about two weeks ago on account of sickness. Of late he has inclined to be melancholy and low-spirited, and spoke several times of going to his brother in in Harrisburg. There is no doubt that he had intended to take his life, as a letter was found on the garret, which he wrote. It stated that he intended killing himself because he was in poor health. It is supposed that the man first placed the gun barrel to his mouth and pulled the trigger with his foot.

#### ANOTHER SUICIDAL ATTEMPT.

Christian Finnefrock Cuts at Both Wrists at Well as His Neck. Alderman McGlinn arrested Christian Finnefrock last evening for drunkenness and disorderly conduct, took him to the station house and handed him over to the officer on duty. Finnefrock was not searched and was locked in a cell by Turnkey Shenck. A few minutes after Finnefrock was locked up, Schenck had occasion to go to Finneup, Schenck had occasion to go to Finnefrock's cell, and he was startled on seeing a
pool of blood in front of him. He hastily
opened the door and Finnefrock told him
he had tried to take his life. The weapon
used was a razor, which he had in his pocket,
and which should have been taken from
him when he was locked up. Gashes were
cut in both wrists and on the right side of the
neck. Dr. Roland was summoned to dress
the wounds. An examination showed that
they were not dangerous. Finnefrock
threatens to take his life the first opportunity
he gets.
