Their atten-tion was called to the express train as it passed and they did not notice the approach of the local freight west, drawn by engine No. 877. The result was that both were struck the train and instantly killed. Neither i were hadly cut, but Fisher's head was ed. The bodies were taken to Kinzer's station, where Deputy Coroner H. H. Rohrer held an inquest, the verdiet being ac-cidental death. The remains were then removed to Columbia, passing through this city at 7:30 last evening.

Al. Snyder, engineer of the train that killed the men, says they were not sitting on the track at the time of the accident. They were standing on the middle track in front of their own engine, when the Johnston train came at full speed down the South track. To avoid the dust made by the train they stepped from the middle to the North track; and not noticing that the local freight west was approaching on that track at equal speed were struck and instantly killed, as

It is a singular circumstance that Henry Brown, a brother of one of the men killed esday, met his death about six year ago in identically the same way. He and George Flick were standing together and seeing a train approaching, stepped back upon the other track when they were inntly killed by a train coming in the ADDITIONAL PARTICULARS.

The Columbia correspondent of the INTEL-LIGENCER sends the following additional articulars of the tragic affair : When the ac-dent occurred, Fisher was struck and

cident occurred, Fisher was struck and hurled against Brown, and together both were dashed against their own engine, Fisher was killed outright, his skull being fractured, while Brown did not expire until twelve minutes after the accident had happened, and until he and Fisher had been carried into the Kinzer tower. The remains were taken charge of by A. J. Musser, of Columbia, on their arrival there, and from his undertaking establishment were transferred to their respective homes.

The nature of the wounds of both men is ample proof that they were not struck while in a sitting position, as the wounds would have been lower down. Fisher, besides having his skull fractured, had a bruise on his left shoulder, and a gash alongside of his nose. Brown's death probably resulted from a sudden shock to his brain, as his skull is not fractured, only gashed, and not deep enough to cause death. Several bruises on his face and a broken finger are the remainder of his injuries. Both men are well and favorably known in

Both men are well and favorably known in Columbia, and greatly respected by all who knew them, as they were sober, industrious and faithful men and employes.

Fisher is aged about II years, married and has one child. He has been in the employ of the P. R. R. Co. for 10 years. He resides on Cherry street. Susquehanna lodge, No. 80, L. O. O. F., to which he belonged, will attend his funeral in a body, but the time has not yet been announced.

Brown resides on Walnut street, above Seventh, is aged 31 years, married and has four children, all girls. His remains will be interred on Saturday at 2 p. m. He was a member of Orion lodge, No. 876, I. O. O. F., and of the Brotherhood and Locomotive Firemen. Both orders will attend his funeral in a body.

Remodelled And Refitted is Pleasing Style

Pine Ornament to Centre Square.

Hirsh & Bro., who have been engaged for

McDonnell; the sand by C. Schwebel; and the lime by Martin Wenger. SOME NOTABLE CEMETERY WORK Fine Specimens of Monumental Art in the Lancaster Cemetery.

A remarkably artistic addition to the works of monumental art in the Lancaster cometery has been made in the monument erected over the grave of the late George M. Steinman, in the family burying gound. It was constructed by Charles M. Howell and does high credit to his taste as a designer and to the mechanical skill of his establishment. It is a solid tomb of new and original design, chaste, plain and rich. On the top is a massive Latin cross; on the end is sculptured in relief a monogram, and on the side is the plain inscription; George M. Steinman, born July 11, 1815, died April 5, 1884. The temb is 7 feet, 3 inches long; 3 feet 10 inches wide, and 5 feet high. Its proportions are shapely, and it has been erected upon a inches wide, and 5 feet high. Its proportions are shapely, and it has been erected upon a base which bears the name "Steinman," in raised letters. The whole affair is of simple beauty and massive in appearance. Nearer the centre of the cemetery a strik-

Nearer the centre of the cemetery a strik-ing memorial, also the work of Mr. Howell, marks the graves of the late Adam Wolf and his wife Mary, and of Seth P. Spencer. It is a graceful design in pure marble, surmount-ed by a classic urn, with cross and crown on one front and Masonic emblems on the other. The lettering is in low relief and the inscripions are in excellent taste.
