

PAYMASTER REAH FRAZER'S CASE. Ris Frankness Commands Respect in Admin

Istration Circles, and the Matter to be Soon Decided. Washington Correspondence Bultimore Sun.

The secretary of the navy will have a very interesting matter to settle in a few weeks Some time ago Paymaster Bellows and P. A. Paymasters Cann and Frazer were tried on the Pacific station for alleged negligence in purchasing stores and paying therefor a higher rate than the market value. Bellows was sentenced to one year's suspension and Cann and Frazer to four. Commander John-son, who commanded the storeship of the station, was sent home for passing the ac-counts of the paymasters. The records in the cases have arrived here, and these officers have retained counsel to present the griev-ances to the secretary, and propose to pro-vent the execution of the sentences if poss-ible. Frazer was tried for another charge be-side that of negligence. On his accounts he certified that the articles had not been pur-chased at the market rate, but that an order Cann and Frazer to four. Commander John certified that the articles had not been pur-chased at the market rate, but that an order of Rear-Admiral Upshur compelled him to purchase at a certain house in Callas, where the prices were much higher than else-where. For this frank statement he was tried for disrespect to his superior officer and found guilty. The secre-tary will probably withhold his decision in the matter until the arrival of the Rear Admiral Upshur, who is expected here early in June. Commander Johnson and the paymaster claim that Rear Admiral Upshur's action was entirely unjust and extremely arbitrary. 

The Widow of the Late Francis Heckert Dies Rather Unexpectedly.

Mary Jane Heckert, widow of the late Francis Heckert, died at her residence No. 45 South Lime street, at an early hour this morning after a few days illness from inflamination of the lungs. She was taken ill on ast Thursday but nothing serious was appreast Thursday but nothing serious was appre-hended and her death was very unexpected. Her malden name was Campbell and she be-came known to our citizens generally by her connection with Dr. Benjamin Mishler's bitter establishment, where she was em-ployed. Her face was disfigured by rea-son of the loss of her nose through cancer, and it was said the cancer was cured by Dr. Mishler's preparations. Some years ago she married Francis Heckert, who was employed as a carrier of the United States mall between the Pennsylvania railroad de-pot and the postoffice. He died a few years ago. Two young children are left, and being without relatives, will be cared for at the Home for Friendless Children.
