### AN ISSUE OF VERACITY.

Miss Suydam Gives Her Side of the Controversy In the Scarlet Fever Case.
In reference to the interview with Dr. D. R. McCormick in these columns on Wednesday last on the question of whether there was any negligence in the treatment of a scarlet fever case in the family of children attending her school, Miss Emily Suydam writes as follows :

"Several weeks ago a warning was given me that a child from the first named (infected) family was in the habit of going into her home. This alarmed me, and upon questioning the child, she freely admitted that she had not only visited the house but had gone into it, the latest visit having been made that morning before school. She was sent home at once and at noon a note from Dr. McC. was handed me to re-admit her. I immediately called on him for an explanation, informed him of the statement she had made to me and he advised me to caution her not to repeat her visits home. He further stated that it was a question whether she could be kept out of school if she did visit the house if it could be proven that she was a resident of another family. This surprised me, but he assured me he would assume all responsibility in this affair, and the child was sent to school. The same afternoon—April 30—complaint was made to me against the hijustice to other children caused by this child's presence in the school. \* \* \* My course of action was prompted solely by the desire to protect the children entrusted to my care.
