REAH FRAZER'S CASE.

An Investigation That is of Interest to Naval Washington Dispatch to the Press.

An investigation of great interest to naval fficers will be begun here within a few Jersey Central..... weeks. The inquiry, it is expected, will fully develop the facts in relation to the purchase of supplies for the South Pacific squad ron, of which Admiral Upshur, who is now on his way home to be retired, has for some In Callao, where most of the stores for

United States vessels are bought, there are several large firms who have furnished supplies for the squadrons of various natious. The firm of Grace Brothers, Americans, have been in the habit of providing United States vessels. Shute & Garland, Englishmen, have supplied British ships of war, and other firms having supplied vessels of the German, French, Italian and other navies. Last winter, when the fleet paymaster of the South Pacific squadron made a requisition through the admiral for supplies, the firm of Shute & Garland were invited by Admiral Upshur to bid against the Grace Brothers, and it is said the Englishmen were promised the admiral's influence. On one of the contracts in which Grace Brothers were lowest bidders in competition with Shute & Garland, the admiral, it is charged, suggested that the award be determined by drawing lots. The gambling having occurred in the admiral's cabin, and Grace Brothers having won, Mr. Upshur, it is alleged, arbitrarily gave the contract to Shute & Garland.

Paymasters are required to certify to the department that their purchases have been made in open market from the lowest responsible bidder. Two or more paymasters of the fleet in forwarding their returns certified that supplies were bought in obedience to the orders of the admiral, but not at the lowest market price. The trouble created over the purchase of supplies was such that Admiral Upshur, presumably in self-defense, ordered a court of inquiry, before which a majority of the officers of the fleet were arraigned.

The court caused considerable scandal, and the American service suffered severely from

The court caused considerable scandal, and the American service suffered severely from the wholesale arraignment of American officers. Paymaster Bellows was consured by the original court composed of seven officers, but its sentence was suspension for one year, with leave pay, which in effect simply gave Bellows leave of absence for a year. This result was unsatisfactory to the admiral who increased the court by the addition of two officers from the flagship, and they sentenced Paymasters Frezer and Cann, who were tried on identically the same charges, to suspension for four years, one half of leave pay and to hold their present numbers, thus excluding them from promotion.

The facts of the case were reported to the navy department. It is understood that Secretary Whitney has rescinded Admiral Upshur's orders regarding the contracts, and that orders have been issued to withhold his pay to the amount of the supplies bought upon his orders but not at the lowest market price.
