BESIEGED BY WITCHES. The Mental Troubles of Mrs. Elizabeth Reichard Now in the Berks County Jail.

From Friday's Reading Eagle, This morning Albert R. Heilig, esq., Dr. Rudolph B. Shultze and 'Squire Weible, of Strausstown, who were appointed by the court to inquire into the sanity of Mrs. Elizabeth Reichard, now in jail, visited her in her cell and had a lengthy conversation with her, during which they found that Mrs. Reichard was apparently quite sane on every subject excepting that of witchcraft. When this subject was broached she talked in such a wild manner that the committee had no doubt but that she is partially deranged. They think that with proper care and treatment she can be cured.

The committee will present their report and testimony taken at Strausstown to the court on Monday. Here they found that Mrs. Reichard had established a wide reputation as a believer in witchcraft. Her hushand testified that she imagined that she was ' verhexed ;" that she did everything possible to drive away the evil spirits, with which she imagined she was beset. She accused certain respectable ladies in Strausstown certain respectable ladies in Strausstown with being witches. She charged that they used their "spells" on her friends, and killed them, and that now they were trying to bewitch her. She resorted to all kinds of methods to drive the evil spirits away. One way to which she resorted was to fill fa tollet vessel with liquor, take it out in the back yard and place a hot lat iron in it to cool off. Another was to cut up a live toad into quaryard and place a hot flat from in it to cool off.

Another was to cut up a live toad into quarters, fry it well and eat it. Still another was to feed a black cat with mother's milk and the witches would be sure to disappear. She was continually afraid that witches would work their charms of spells upon her, and to keep them off carried the feathers of three doves wrapped in the first two charters of doves wrapped in the first two chapters of Genesis next to her heart.

The husband testified that when he went
