Pruning Rose Bushes. From the Vick's Magazine.

Recently planted rose bushes may pruned at once. They will not be very rapid n commencing growth, and it is best when they do begin that the wood formed should be permanent. We usually shorten the be permanent. We usually shorten the branches to within four or five eyes from the bottom of each. Plants put in last year, or in former seasons, should be prured according to their habit. Shy-growing varieties should never be hard pruned, as there is a possibility of crippling them, but robust growers are ben-eficial by a rather severe pruning. Early pruning is a great mistake, as it induces the lower buds to start into growth prematurely. ower buds to start into growth prematurely and they frequently suffer for it in being overtaken by frost. Plants which have overtaken by frost. Frants which mayor formed a number of small growths and a few very strong long ones should have the small ones closely cut in, and the strong shoots relied on for a supply of the bloom. About six inches of a growth, at the most, is sufficent. What we have noted may be described as the short-spur system of pruning, but it as the short-spur system of pruning, but it is not the only mode of dealing successfully

Surring Wet Soil.

Stirring wet soil has such a bad effect that an entire season's cultivation will fail to make it friable and mellow. Especially is this the case with heavy land, where hard lumps point clearly to the mistake made in early spring. Nothing is ever gained by planting seeds in wet soil, for the surface will certainly bake hard and cause failure of germination. Should abundant moisture remain after heavy rains, it is not a fit place for the garden, under such conditions are few indeed. the other hand, the moment soil is sufficiently work loosely, the better for early

Fruit for Farmers.

Farmers should have a large variety of fruits, such as peaches, prunes, cherries, pears, plums, nectarines, quinces, crabs, grapes, raspberries, strawberries, currants, etc. Peaches should be planted on a northern slope, and should be mulched with rotten straw, coarse manure, litter, sawdust, etc., It makes the ground hold moisture in a time of drought. Their culture is about the same as apples. It would be a good policy for farmers to set out a wind-brake on the north and west side of their orchards, composed for Norway spruce, to protect their trees from the severe winter and storms.
