of almost fourseore. Dunn, who came from Pittsburg to Erie on a steamer, was spending a few days with Brown, who has been living the life of a hermit in the woods of late years. On Thursday morning Duan's mutilated body was found outside of Brown's shanty, while a trail of blood from his pallet on the floor inside, and the bespattered furniture indicated a terrible struggle. The body had been gashed till the heart was cut in fwain, the bowels slashed, the skull split, and the head almost severed from the trunk. A

bloody axe lay near by.

Brown protests his innocence, and says that the deed was committed during the night and before he came home, and that he first learned of it when he awoke that morning, saw the pools of blood and the body lying outside. Brown lays the crime body lying outside. Brown lays the crime to a tramp, whom he says Dunn drove away on account of his impertinence. Brown adds that the tramp threatened to return and kill

them both.

Dunn was a finely formed specimen of manhood. Brown is a demon when under the slightest excitement. He served a term in the Western penitentiary for burning several barns in Mercer county half a century ago. A few years since he served another term for shooting a neighbor, Albert Thornton, who had interceded in behalf of Brown's fifth wife, whom he was trying to kill. fifth wife, whom he was trying to kill. Brown was put under arrest to await devel-

The murder was one of the most brutal in the annals of crime in the region, and shows a cold-blooded, deliberate butchery, which was simply demonical. Brown, who was disowned by his family years ago, is highly connected, has two sons, who are merchants in Greenville, Pa., and a brother, who served n a recent Congress from a Pennsylvania
