He was a member of the state House of Repre-sentatives of Florida in 1874, and was elected to the United States Securic as a Conserve to the United States Senate as a Conserva-tive Democrat to succeed Abijah Gilbert, Re-publican, and took his seat March 5, 1875. He was re-elected in 1881.

SLAFE AND BERF.

What Freedmen Accomptish in a Republic and Autocracy,

Next year the negroes of the country will celebrate the twenty-fifth anniversary of the Emancipation proclamation. Now it is interesting to put side by side the former slave of the United States with the former serf of Russia. Both of them were enchained about the same time, at the very beginning of the seventeenth century, and both of them were set free about the same time, two and a half centuries since. One of them dreamed of the "golden charter" by virtue of which the land saturated with sweat and tears of his kin should be given to him, and the other dreamed of " forty acres and a mule," as a compensation for the long, long labor of his race, and both got neither. The former, his race, and both got heither. The former, however, was forced to buy from his master eight acres of land. In a few years to the former serf was granted the right of taking part in the local administration, and to the former slave were granted the right of American citizenship. Thus they began the race of life. To-day we find that the former black slave leaves far behind him the former whith serf, and it is certainly because the one whith serf, and it is certainly because the one has been making his way in a republic, and the other in the autocratic country. There are, to day, thousands of learned

colored pastors and scores of bishops, filling the pulpits of their own free choice. No for-mer serf of Russia as yet has had an oppor-tunity to master theology and to get ordained

as a priest.

The legislative assemblies of different states and the Congress are open to the col-ored representatives of the people, who come there together with the white citizens to make iaws for the state and the republic, No peasant of Russia can have to-day any part in the general administration of his country. There are about one hundred and fift periodicals published in this country by the

periodicals published in this country by the colored journalists. In Russia not a single newspaper belongs to the peasantry, of whom as yet very few can read at all. The imperial government itself publishes for them a weekly, the Fillinge Messenger, which is sent gratis to all the village authorities.

There are thousands of colored lawyers, whereare thousands of colored lawyers,

physicians, professors, authors and men of other professions. In Russia, all of these professions, as yet, are almost inaccessible to the former serfs and their sons. It is evident, then, that the former seris of It is evident, then, that the former seris of Russia, while thanking God for their free-dom and the success they have made during the first quarter of a century of their liberty, have yet much to attain and much to do in on this side of the Atlantic, the American

A race gifted with many of the noblest qualities of humanity, strong in intellect and quick in apprehension, could not for centuries complain of grievances if they did not exist, and the grievances could not exist for centuries without serious reproach to the British government. To the lasting honor of American statemanship, sating honor of American statesmanship, Southern grievances were not allowed by neglect or arrogance to grow and become chronic after the civil war had closed. The one safeguard against an evil so great was the restoration of self-government to the people who had rebelled, the broadening of the elective franchise, the abolition of caste and privilege. If Englishmen had studied the reconstruction policy instead of deriding it, they might have learned that the American government accomplished for the South can government accomplished for the South in four years what their own government has failed to accomplish for Ireland through ten generations.
