LYNCH LAW IN HEW JERSEY. Mob's Switt Punishment for a Beastly As

sault Upon a Young Woman. colored man named Samuel Johnson alias " Mingo Jack," was arrested in Eaton town, N. J., on Friday evening upon a charge of felonious assault made by Miss Angelina Herbert, the daughter of James Stewart Herbert, a farmer living on the road which leads from Entontown to Asbury Park. The accused was locked up in the little brick jail. About I o'clock next morn ing the jail was broken open, and after John-son had been clubbed until he was nearly dead be was hanged. At 6 o'clock William Abbott, a laborer, discovered the body of Johnson hanging from the iron grating over the entrance to the jail. Abbott gave the alarm, and in a few minutes fully 500 persons gathered around the jail. The body swung to and fro until the arrival of Coroner R. T. Smith, of Red Bank, who cut it down. The face had been so badly besten that it was difficult to tell whether the corpse was that of a colored man or a white one. The right eye had been knocked out and lay upon the cheek. The two jail cells were bespattered with blood. On the floor of one of them were two oak clubs covered with blood and hair. It is known who lynched the negro, and the people of the town, although greatly excited over the affair, are not at all anxious to find them. Johnson hanging from the iron grating over

anxious to find them.

Miss Herbert is a blonde of slight figure, about 24 years of age. She is very delicate. She had known Johnson, who lived in the neighborhood all his life, by sight for several neighborhood all his life, by sight for several years. She was on her way to the house of Jackson Brown, a neighbor, at the time the assault was committed. While in a pathway which leads through the woods lying between her home and Brown's house she was overtaken by Johnson. The negro caught her by the throat and told her that if she did not comply with his wishes he would kill her. He then dragged her into the woods at the comply with his wishes he would kill her. He then dragged her into the woods at the side of the path for about seventy-five yards. Knocking her down by striking her a blow behind the left ear he accomplished his purpose, and then struck off through the woods to his cabin.

Miss Herbert succeeded in reaching her home, and told her terrible story. Her father drove to Eatontown for John C. Edwards, a drove to Eatontown for John C. Edwards, a justice of the peace. Constable Henry Leibenthal heard of the crime committed by the negro, and at once drove out to his house, and found him chopping wood. Johnson refused to say anything when the officer accused him of assaulting Miss Herbert, and submitted quietly to arrest. He was placed in a cell before Justice Edwards had taken the deposition of Miss Herbert.

The young girl positively identified Johnson as her assailant. She is confined to herbed from the injuries she received at his hands. There is a large lump on the back of her head where she was struck by Johnson with a blunt instrument of some kind.

Constable Leibenthal was the last person who saw the negro before he was lynched.

who saw the negro before he was lynched. He went to the jail at 10:20 p.m. and fixed the fire. When he asked the prisoner how he was Johnson answered: "I feel all right: was Johnson answered: "I feel all right; but some boys outside have been yelling that I will be killed." Johnson was nearly 70 years of age and had a wite and five children. For several years he had been working at odd jobs. He was at one time in the employ of Dr. Laird as a jockey, and rode Mingo, a famous racing-horse. This gave him the nickname of "Mingo Jack." He had always been feared by the people living in that section, and countless crimes were laid at his door. A year ago he was shot while trying to rob a peduler.

John W. Swartz, the assistant prosecutor of the pleas of Mommouth county, came to Extontown and began an official investgation. Corener White swore in a jury of twelve men, with Littleton White as forcman. After the jury had viewed the body of the dead negro the coroner adjourned the in-
