THE STREET LIGHT QUESTION Proposals for Lighting the City of Lancaster, Pa., with the Edison Incandescent

Light. To the Lamp Committee:
GENTLEMEN: Pursuant to the request of your committee, published in the Lancaster papers and the Electrical World, of New York, for proposals for lighting the city of Lancaster with electric light, I beg to submit herewith my proposition, together with a map of Lancaster, marked "Exhibit A.," showing all the streets, alleys and ratiways of said city, upon which map I have marked the location of the lights I think necessary to install, in order to produce a better effect and more even distribution of light, than is possible to obtain by the use of either electric

tre-light or gas.

The red dots on the map indicate lights of 32andle-power: the blue dots ladicate lights of is-candle-power.

By reference to the map you will see that I have placed eight 32 candle-power lamps in Centre or Monument square—225 52-candle-power. nument square-225 52-candle-power mps-one at the intersection of every

lamps—one at the intersection of every street, as well as at every railway crossing in the city. I have placed one Eleandie-power lamp at the centre of each block, one-half mile each way from Centre or Monument square.

I have also placed 20: 16-candle power lamps, located at the centre of blocks, and at all alloys, intersecting streets, as well as all crossings of alleys in the central part of the city, one-half mile each way. I also propose to include in my bid for this lighting, 40 electric lamps of 32-candle-power each, to be placed either by the Lamp Committee or Committee of Connells, in dark recesses and dangerous places with which I am not acquainted, but where more than ordinary illumination is required, in order to light the city according to the above specifications, and "Exhibit A," upon permission to do so by the Council, I will creet the electric mains and attach the lamps to the pres

ent city lamp posts in a similar manner indi-cated by the drawing hereto attached, marked "Exhibit B." I will also erect, at my own cost, suitable wooden posts, similar to "Exhibit C." in all places where there are no city posts. And will complete the entire system, and supply the lights for one year, commencing on the night of June 1, 1886, for the sum of (\$20,000) twenty thousand dollars, payable in monthly installments of \$1,663.67) sixteen hundred, sixty six dollars and sixty-seven cents.
