Tarns Up Between Two Pieces of Sheet Iron

On March 2, as was noted in the INTELLI-GENCER at the time, Philip J. Risse died in the 70th year of his age. He was an old man who had spent his lifetime in Lancaster, and had accumulated quite a goodly sum of money. He had fancies, one of them being that banks were not safe depositories for money, and that burial of treasure in the earth was far preferable. When the old gentleman died it was believed that some funds would be found in very quaint places. In ascertaining the personal property of the decessed it was noticed that a \$500 four percent. government bond was missing, and none could give any theory for its absence. John A. Coyle, esq., attorney for Michael Haberbush, the executor of the estate, had advised that the heirs divide the personal property among themselves, as there were no creditors. In the division there fell to Victor Risse, a son, the tinsmith tools of his father and with them a lot of sheet iron, old tin, etc. Rummaging over his possessions a few days ago, Mr. Risse noticed two rectangular pleees of sheet iron sticking together, being attached by the bent ends of each. Prying them apart, he was amazed to find the missing \$500 bond. He promptly turned it over to the executor as a part of the funds of the estate.

Had there been a sale of the personal effects of the deceased, and the sheet-iron sold to a stranger it is doubtful if the family would ever have heard of the missing bond. And it is probable that its possessor, had he told of it, would not have been willing to part with his treasure troye without some monied consideration. that banks were not safe depositories
