NEARLY FRIGHTENED TO DEATH. Result of an Attempt to Cure a Young Girl of Her Wayward Habits.

The daughter of Henry Richards, a farmer living between Rahway and Plainfield, N. J., near a small settlement called Oak Tree, is lying at the point of death in consequence of ort which was made to make her reform her wayward disposition. The girl who is between fourteen and fifteen years of age, and quite matured for her years, has been in the habit of going out in the evenings with some of the farmers' sons, and was disposed not to heed the counsel of her parents, who strongly opposed such actions. As the girl seemed determined to pursue her wild habits, a scheme was concocted by her father and uncle, whereby it was believed that the girl would be taught such a lesson as would forever cure her of the proneness to wander from home after dark. So one evening a short time ago, after satisfying themselves that the girl was contemplating another meeting with her companions, her lather and uncle left the house ahead of her, and, going down the country road, lay in wait for her, disguising themselves so as not to be recognized.
