At the national convention of the Junior lar of American Mechanics, which will be held at Richmond, Virginia, in June next, the representation from each state where there is a state organization will consist of five delegates and the past councillors of the state, thereby giving the oldest organization the largest representation. One of the ob-jects of the animated controversy which will revail at the forthcoming convention will be the change of the name of the order. The agitation for this arises from the fact that the Junior Order of U. A. M. do not consider themselves "junior" to the parent organization, the O. U. A. M., and are desirous of breaking away therefrom in every way. The name which is proposed is "Order of United Americans," and for this the fight will be made. NOT UP TO THE GUARANTEE.

The Fourth Trial Made of the New Clapp & Tuesday afternoon the fourth trial of the new Clapp & Jones engine was made, and al-though it was more satisfactory than the previous ones, the machine did not yet come up to the 260 feet throw required of it. The trial was made at Ann and Orange streets, and there was quite a crowd present, includ-ing the inventor and the lire committee. There was a great deal of difference of opinion in regard to the distance that the water was thrown by the engine. At the first test the hose was placed out Orange street towards Plum. Two lines of 100 feet each were attached to a Siamese coupling and 50 more feet from that were used. Through an inch and a quarter nozzle with 145 pounds of steam and 235 of water pressure, 215 feet were thrown. As this test was made against the wind no record of it was made by the

committee. The second trial was made on Ann street with the same supply of hose and same nozzle; 145 pounds of steam and 235 water. The distance that the water was thrown, as taken by the fire committee, was 247 Other people made it less and it was said by some that not more than 240 feet was covered. As there was some difference of opinion in As there was some difference of opinion in regard to the distance, another test was made. A new nozzle, which was of the same size as the other, was put on and according to the committee's figures 250 feet was clearly thrown. This will be reported to council.

A test was made through two fifty feet lines to a Siamese coupling with 50 feet more from that. With 145 pounds of steam and 255 of water 244 feet were thrown. and 235 of water 244 feet were thrown. The engine threw two separate and distinct streams 219 feet each, although it was only claimed to throw two streams 200 feet. The fire committee of councils held a meeting last night at which it was unanimously agreed to reccommend to councils the acceptance of the new engine.
