PRIMARY ELECTION LAW

Here Are Some Points for the Republican Polit leat Aspirants to Ponder This Week. The supreme court on Monday handed down a very important decision in the case of the commonwealth ex rel. attorney general against John Leonard, commissioner of Schuylkill county. The opinion is by Judge Paxson and affords the first important judicial interpretation by the supreme court of the primary election law of 18st. The proceeding was a writ of quo warranto by the commonwealth to test the right of Leonard to hold his office as commissioner of Schuyl-

kill county.

It was conceded that the defendant was a Republican candidate for the office in 1884 Republican candidate for the office in 1884 and was duly elected by a large majority at the election of that year; that he was duly returned as elected and had entered upon his office. The commonwealth alleged that defendant had been guilty of bribery, fraud and a violation jot the election laws. This the latter denied and the case was tried before a jury, who found for the commonwealth, and the court passed a judgment of ouster against the defendant. Leonard took this writ of error to the supreme court and the substantial error alleged to have been committed by the common pleas of Schuylkill county was its failure to instruct the jury that the primary election laws of the commonwealth and that therefore a violation of its provisions would not be a violation of the election laws.

The supreme court holds, aftirming the decision of the lower court, that the primary election law is an election law without the intent of section nine of article eight of the constitution, which holds that "any person who shall, while a caudidate for office, be guilty of bribery, traud or wilful violation of any election law, shall be forever disqualified office, etc. Judge Paxson, says

"The constitution provides for the interest well as for the present. Hence when it speaks of a violation of any election laws as were in force when it was adopted, it means any election law then in existence or there-after to be passed by the legislature which that body had a right to pass. * * * The argument has failed to satisfy us that the act argument has failed to satisfy us that the act in question is objectionable upon constitutional grounds. The proposition that the legislature may not prohibit and punish translat primary elections and nominating conventions is certainly a novel one. The argument that it is not valid because it is not expressly authorized by the constitution is unsound. The converse of the proposition is true that the legislature may proposition is true, that the legislature may pass such laws unless prohibited from doing so by the constitution. The act in question is a perfect law as far as its validity depends upon mere form. It is complete within itself. It defines and punishes oftenses of the gravest character, the existence of which has been known to every intelligent person in the state for many years, and which, more than anything else, has underminded and weak-ened our whole system of government. To say the legislature may not lay its hand upon a public evil of such vast proportions is to say that our government is too weak to pre-serve its own life. There is not a line in the constitution which, in express terms or by any reasonable implication, forbids this

As to the question raised on the argument whether Leonard was a "candidate" for his office prior to his nomination by his party office prior to his nomination by his party within the meaning of the constitution, Judge Paxson says: "The word "candidate" in the constitution is to be understood in its ordinary popular meaning as the people understood it whose votes at the polision gave that instrument the force and effect of organic law. Websiter defines the word to mean 'One who seeks or aspires to some office or privilege, or who offers himself for the same.' This is the popular meaning of the word and is doubtless the meaning which the members of the constitutional convention attached to it, and the sense in which the people regarded it, when they which the people regarded it, when the came to vote. We therefore say in every day life that a man is a candidate for an office when he is seeking such office. It is be g ging the question to say that he is only a can-ultate after nomination, for many persons have been elected to office who were never nominated at all. We hold, therefore, that the defendant was a candidate for office within the constitution as well as the act of ISI. It while such candidate he was guilty of any wilful violation of any 'election law he comes directly within the constitutional provision. What is an election law? When the people inserted in their constitution the words 'any election law' it is fair to assume that they meant any law relating to elections. That primary elections come within the mis chief intended to be remedied is too plain for argument. I nder our frame of government a vast system of political machinery has grown up, by which elections have been for many years practically controlled. It is so far-reach-ing in its effects that the people have in many instances little to do at the polls beyond the ratification of what had been already done by nominating conventions. The influence which these primary elections have been for good or evil upon the polities of the country is overshadowing. In many counties of the state, as is well known, a nomination by a convention of one of the parties is practically equivalent to an election. The importance of the relation of the primary to the general election must be apparent to every one who does not shut his eyes that he may not see or stop his ears that he may not hear.

"By the words 'any election law' the framers of the constitution and the people who adopted it evidently meant it to include any art which the legislature might thereafter enact for the purpose of purifying our elections." ratification of what had been already done by

enact for the purpose of purifying our elec-tions. The act of 1881 was passed to give effect to this constitutional provision and it matters little at what stage of the campaign the fraud is committed. We are of opinion that the act of June 8, 1881, is an election law within the meaning of section 9, article 8, of the constitution. Judgment is affirmed."
