The man was a very fluent taker and complimented Mr. Haver-erob upon his fine stock. He said he was a merchant in Philadelphia and had errol upon his non stock. He said he was a merchant in Philadelphia and had about \$5,000 worth of goods in the custom home of that city. The duty on these goods was \$150, and he could not got them, as be had not that amount of money. After a short conversation the man left the store. In a short time another German came into the store and talked about the stock of goods Mr. Haberstroh had on hand. The man said he would like to purchase such a stock, and while he was talking in came the first man who soon became interested in the conversa-tion. He again repeated his need of \$180, to pay the duty upon his goods in the custom home. The second man offered 50 cents as a sum towards the amount, but it was retused. German No. 1, then brought out a small tin box, which resembled a sardine box, and upon opening it the contents showed a lot of jeweiry, which the owner offered as a security for the loan of the necessary amount. No. 2 examined the contents and remarked that the articles were worth double the amount asked for. 
