Restoring Rancid Butter

From the Germantown Telegraph. It is not unfrequently the case that the farmer's wife who has the care of the butter has some that for some cause has grown rancid, and any one who has ever been troubled at all in that way knows that rancid butter is of little account. Among numerous ways that are employed to restore such butter to condition that it may be used is the follow-ing: To a plat of water aid thirty drops of liquor of chloride of lime, and in this wash two and a half pounds of rancid butter; after two and a half pounds of rancid butter; after every particle has come in contact with the water, let it stand an hour or two and then wash in clean pure water. Another method is this: Wash the butter in good new milk, after which wash in cold spring water.

Encially is believed to be caused by the presence of butyric acid, which is freely soluble in new milk, and hence the through washing is expected to remove the acid and the cause of rancidity. Another method is

Another method is to heat up a quarter of a pound of good tresh lime in a pall of water, and after allowing it to stand for an hour, or until all impurities have settled, pour off the clear portion and wash thoroughly the rancid butter in it. Bad butter is sometimes caused by feed of cows or unclean utensis. To neutralize this it is sometimes advisable to use half a pint of vinegar, or a few drops of some acid, to each gallon of cream as a neutralizing agent. The Use of Horses.

From the Germantown Telegraph Very many who are in the habit of using borses continually fail to realize the amount of labor that is imposed upon them. Take a roadster that is free in the harness, and it is a roadster that is free in the harness, and it is driven more miles than is usually thought of. While it is true that a high lived, spirited horse requires exercise to harden the muscles and fit it for travel, the opposite extreme must be avoided. No horse should be overworked. Much attention is required in the care of horses, or they will unexpectedly become injured. It is not the nature of a horse to receive the rough or severe treatment that an ox will endure without any serious injury. Many a valuable horse has been ruined from being injudiciously driven and exposure thereafter. A horse may have never so good a body, and without feet and legs will be almost wortheas. The feet and legs seem to be the recipients of all troubles of a serious nature. A horse driven rapidly, and in perspiration left in a draft of cold air, will be liable to be injured. Regarding the extent of driving, Mr. Russel, secretary of the Massachusetts board of agriculture, in a lecture to farmers, urged the point with great force that driving a horse thirteen miles every day during the week was a full day's work, and all that could be done by a horse without overwork. The fear is that there are a great many horses in this country that are overworked. driven more miles than is usually thought of.
