The Hog Crop. It would seem as if the hog crop would be comparatively small. Disease has made such ravages that many have been deterred from breeding as extensively as usual, and it is said that abortion is very prevalent in many sections. The number of pigs will likely, therefore, be much smaller than is common. The natural expectation then is, if that is true, that prices will be higher; and if there should be no disease to carry off our swine those who will have hogs to sell will be made to feel good. Then as usual everybody will go to breeding hogs again, and down will come the price once more. According to the theory of the Chicage board of trade the butterine business ought to make swine breeding very profitable. Last week the board through a series of resolutions instructed Congress that the manufacture of elemar-garine added at least four dollars to the value of every bullock. The very fact that they selected elemargarine as the subject of their adulation showed that they did not know anything about what they were resolv-ing upon. It is very curious that a Chicago board of trade should praise eleomargarine and never mention butterine, which is made here in much larger quantities than oleo-margarine is. Now if the eleomargarine business increases the value of bullocks, the butterine business must increase the value of swine. But if it has had that effect, the

swine. But if it has had that effect, the swine breeder has failed to see it.

But the future of swine breeding in this country is by no means an unpromising one, if breeders will exercise judgment and care and our government will see to it that no injustice is done to the American hog by foreign governments. We but reterate what we have often said, that the industry of the United States depends for success upon a more judicious system of feeding. We must feed less corn, or the industry will receive more serious sythacks than it ever has. Hogs that are guifed with corn, generation after generation, will succumb to disease sooner or later. It is inevitable. But if we will begin and persevere in strengthening the constitutional vigor of our swine, the breeding of our hogs must become steadily profitable. The entire world is going to have American pork sooner or later. It is as good pork as the world can produce, and it can of course be sold cheaper than the domestic pork of foreign nations will, if it has no American competition. This will settle the matter some time. The peo ple of such nations will have our pork or raise a row; so may look to foreign consu-mers to do us justice, if our government will not do it. It would be a serious blow to our prosperity, to permanently cripple our swine husbandry. Thinking people have en-deavored to impress Congress with this fact, but it seems to be too stopid to see it.

Hoot Crops. From the Germantown Telegraph, If a reasonable degree of success is hoped for in the cultivation of root crops, they must receive a fair share of attention. Even potatoes, from a little neglect, may be reduced very much in yield, and then coming to onions, carrots, beets and turnips, when neglected, a stronger case is presented. As a general rule, any soil that is possessed naturally of a high state of fertility, or is rendered so by means of manures, will give growth to more or less weeds. And if the rule that cultivated crops and weeds applies with any force in the growth of ordinary field crops, it applies with double force in the case of root crops, and especially so with onlons, for the reason that they have no heavy follage, which, by its overpowering influence, aids in the struggle for existence with the growing weeds. That onlons or carrots can be grown with weeds may not be denied, but it can be said with very much truth that the very much reduced reason the farmer had better attend to his root crops in tenson, rather than to let the weeds get such a start as to get the lead, and after continuing the race throughout the en-tire season come in just a little shead at last. It is the work in time that accomplishes the most good. A few hours' labor in season

Look to the Trees. It is not a bad time of the year now it has been neglected before to attend to the cleaning of the rough and musty bark of fruit and other trees. These places are har bors for numberless eggs of insects and of the insects themselves. They will now soon come into life. Destroying a single egg mass now may prevent the hatching of many. It is not meant by this that the bark is to be scraped meant by this that the bark is to be scraped down to the green surface, as is sometimes seen, nor anywhere near it. It is only necessary to remove the scaly bark ready to fail away. The work should really have been done early in the spring, but it is not too late now. When cleaned it will be better if the trunks be scrubbed with soft soap suds as strong as can be made. Whatever may be the system of orchard culture it is essential that grass and trash be kept away from tial that grass and trash be kept away from the base of the trunks of trees. This alone will often prevent the attacks of borers, especially if during the season of egg depositing the exposed places are occasionally rub-bed with hard soap.

Underground Electric Cables.

Speaking of the experimental underground electric cables which have been laid in Philadelphia, Electrician Walker says: The electric light cable is covered with lead and is half an inch in diameter and the telegraph cable is three-quarters of an inch in diameter, both of them weighing about twenty tons.
