## ABIE POWDEN'S CASE.

the Ten-Year-Old Orphan. The circumstances of the sending of little Able Powden, a boy under ten years of age, at the instance of his uncle, to the House of cluge, as narrated in the INTELLIGENCER, has awakened a great deal of popular interest in the lad and has brought to light some facts which strengthen our conviction that he is the victim of abuse. It seems that his father. Abram Powden, a highly respected member of the order of Odd Fellows, died in Altoona on March 13, 1876, before the lad was born. After his birth his mother and step-sister came to this city and were cared for by the grandfather, Isaac Powden, of North Mul-berry street. The mother died when little Abe was only sixteen months old; the step-sister died at the Children's Home; when his grand mother became too feeble to take care of him the lad went to his uncle's, Henry Powden's. From investigations made among the neighbors we are convinced that he was in unfit hands and ill-treated. His grandfather feels outraged that he was committed to the House of Refuge; a num-ber of kind-hearted neighbors have called

at the INTELLIGENCER office to say that a good home can be found for him; one good woman, with a family of her own children, offers to take him as one of them; and a prominent gentleman who takes an interest in the case will institute proceedings to have e boy brought back. In Argument Court.
