The mill is un-ter the management of a stork committee. might in the making of iron. The mill is un-der the management of a stock company and in almost entirely a home industry. The heaviest stockholder of the company is Mr. H. H. Houston, of Philadelphia. The com-cent purchased the machinery, etc., in the Hummell mill at Harrisburg, which place was torn down during last February and removed to Columbia. The size of the mill is 160 feet in length and so feet in width with a side attachment, making the upper part of the mill 120 feet in width and is situted at the foot of Union street, along the Columbia & Port Deposit railroad. It has all Columbia & Port Deposit railroad. It has all the facilities for receiving the stock and shipping iron to all points. The general manager of the mill is Mr. C. S. Kaufman and William McDivitt is the mill superintendent. The mill contains two heating and six puddling furnaces and will manufacture merchant bar, small size scalp iron, used for making pipes, and horse shoe iron. The new industry will employ seventy-five hands, and is a welcome addition to the industrial works of Columbia.
