### Heavy Wheat Movements.

TOLEDO, Ohio, July 23.-The movements of wheat to this point so early in the season is unprecedented, the receipts aggregating an average of 400 hundred cars daily for the pas-five days. There is a scarcity of currency for age of 400 hundred cars daily for the past handling this vast amount of grain, sim-ply because the banks here do not seen o have provided for such an early move ment. Four persons were cupped at the nape or behind the ears; about eight ounces were abstracted in each case. They all recovered. The individuals in whom blood-letting was resorted to were all strong, full-blooded, heavy men, with injected conjunctiva, the veins of their necks standing out prom-inently, the pulse being full and bounding convulsions setting in early. Dry Cups, employed in sunstroke cases, were valueless, but in those affected by heat

were valueless, but in those affected by heat exhaustion the benefit was well marked and immediate, the patients invariably regaining consciousness after their application. Tincture of digitalis, in twenty minim doses, administered when the patient was first seen acted as an excellent heart stimulant. The pulse at once became fuller and slower, the heart beating more regularly.
