Robert J. Burdette, in Brooklyn Engle. OPPOSED TO CREMATION.

Archbishop Ryan Receives Instructions from the Vallean Archbishop Ryan recently received a circular letter from Rome, containing the opinion of the holy see on the subject of cremation of the dead in relation to Catholic burial. The

document is as follows: The holy see has been asked by many Catholics about the cremation of the dead, a custom which is rapidly extending in Italy. The office has just rendered the following

decree:

"1. Is it permissible to affiliate with societies whose aim it is to increase the custom of cremation of the dead?

"2. Is it permissible either to have one's cremated?

cremation of the dead?

"2 Is it permissible either to have one's own body or that of any one else cremated?

"The most eminent and reverend cardinal lathers, inquisitors general on matters of the faith, after having seriously and for a long time examined the proposed questions, and after having consulted the reverend advisers, have decided to reply:

"To the first question negatively, and if the societies mentioned have any affiliation with the Masonic sect the members will be subject to the penance inflicted upon Masons.

"To the second question negatively.

"Upon this report being made to cur body father the pops, Leo XIII, his holiness has approved and confirmed the resolutions of the most eminent fathers, and has decreed that they shall be transmitted to rectors of parishes in order that they shall take pains to instruct the faithful concerning this culpable abuse in turning the human body, and in order that they shall turn from it the flocks intrusted to their care."

"The Catholic church has never approved of cremation of the dead," said a prominent Philadelphia Catholic priest. "It is against the traditions of the church, as the Christian dead were burned in the catacombs in the early days to distinguish them from the heathens who were burned according to the Roman method. We do not believe it is sinful to practice cremation, but consider it inexpedient and contrary to Christian instincts. Our Lord was buried, and we consider that the best way of disposing of the doad."

Right Rev. Monsignor Corcoran, D. D., of St. Charles' seminary, had an exhaustive article on the subject in the last number of the Catholic Quarterly Review.

A Pot of Gold Found in a Cella

Last fall, in Youngstown, Ohio, William Henry, of Poland, moved from the house in which he had lived for many years, and shortly afterward the house was moved away. On Saturday while J. L. A Mirage of the Thousand Islands.

A spectacle which in this country greets the eye seldom more than once in a lifetime was enjoyed by the people of Carthage, N. Y., on Thursday, between the hours of 12 and 2 p. m. On elevated points about the village looking directly north and northwest, could be seen in a mirage the St. Lawrence river and the inviting and picturesque Thousand Islands. These objects were plainly visible Islands. These objects were plainly visible to the naked eye as though they were only a half mile distant. The water, the islands, and at times, steamboats plying on the river, the village of Clayton, the Round Island house, and the city of Ogdensburg, were plainly outlined against the sky. One party recognized the cottage of Thomas G. Alvord, situated opposite Clayton, and pointed out to bystanders points in the vicinity by which he recognized it. This rare spectacle was presented to the views of hundreds of excited and eager persons, who were entranced by it for several hours. It filled all onlookers with wonder and admiration. The distance from Carthage to Clayton, the nearest point on the St. Lawrence, is 36 miles.
