The puddlers were receiving

mages. The puddlers were receiving the state of the many and they wanted a survance to \$3.85. The other men wanted a corresponding advance. The prices asked for by the employees are what is called Philadelphia prices. A committee was appointed to wait upon General Manager William Patton and state the matter to him. This was refused, although Mr. Patton offered an increase to \$3.75. The men would not accept and then the entire force of skilled labor left their work and are still on the strike. The puddlers of the Columbia rolling mill went on a strike some few days ago for an advance from \$3.50 to \$3.85, and on account of two of the workmen oeing discharged for not complying with a rule of the mill. These men are still out, and yesterday alternoon the balance of the employes left their work. The men in the Columbia fron company's mill notified the managers yesterday that they would not return to work until they were given Philadelphia prices, and are in consequence on a strike. The employes of the three mills are fully determined in their purpose not to return to work until their demands are acceded to, it is thought that the difficulty will be speedily adjusted. The management of the Susquehams rolling mill are considering the payment of the proposed advance, and if this mill gives their employes the advanced prices the other mills will most likely do the same. The men are very quiet and orderly during the difficulty, but are fully determined not to work unless Philadelphia prices are paid. The strike throws about four hundred men out of employment.

He further says before this at least a half dozen men had quit work in the same way yet were not discharged.]
