#### LOOKING AFTER THE HACKMEN. An Ordinance Regulating Their Business to Be

Passed By Councils. There has been a great deat of complaint, by citizens of Lancaster as well as strangers, about the loose manner in which the hack business is conducted in this city, and the conduct of some of the backmen is not what it should be. Recent incidents have set the it should be. Recent incidents have set the people to thinking and measures will now be taken to regulate the business and keep the hack drivers in the straight path of duty. There is not another town in the state, outside of Pittsburg and Philadelphia, where so many hacks are used upon the streets. There are eight or nine lines in Lancaster at present, and they each run from one to four and five teams. At the meetings of councils next Wednesday night the matter will be brought up by a well known member of select branch, who has taken it in charge. An ordinance will be introduced and very likely passed, which will compel owners of hacks to take out yearly licenses. The drivers will be obliged to wear badges with their numbers on their hats or clothing, and they will be compelled to display their numbers on the hack lamps, which will have to be kept lighted at night. The names of the drivers of each hack will be taken and placed on a register. In this way strangers will be able to ascertain who drives them and they will be protected. The city will sell the curbing along the Chestnut street side of the Pennsylvania railroad station and a hack stand will be made there. The arrangements will be a new source of revenue to the city and irresponsible persons will not be given licenses.
