

Ex-City Solicitor J. W. Johnson Settles With

The Finance Committee. This morning ex-City Solicitor J. W. Johnson gave a check for \$1,479.91 to the city treas urer, money in his hands which he acknowledged to belong to the city. Of the more than eighteen bundred dollars for which he than eighteen bundred dollars for which he was sued, the above check represents the part of it which is not in dispute. There is still in question \$158.65 which Mr. John-son claims for four jury suits in the court of common pleas and for commissions on collections. As ex-solicitor for the city he proposes to keep his collent's money until the issue is decided. client's money until the issue is decided. Mr. Johnson says the chairman of the fi-nance committee has had his statement for two months, and he thought it was satisfactory until he was wakened up one evening by an INTELLIGENCEN editorial. The Philadelphia *Times* in an editorial re-view of the situation to-day says: "The fact that the law fixes a specific salary for the

city solicitor and declares that 'no attorney shall be paid him directly or indirectly out of the city treasury,' seems to put Mr. Johnson clearly in the wrong and to expose him to the charge of legal embezziement."

#### FATALLY KICKED BY A MULP.

Emanuel Lawrence Dies From Injuries he
