PRACTICAL COUNTY PAIRS. They Would Get a Lively Hoom, if Young Women Would Cook at Them.

There appears to be a desire on the part of

managers of county fairs throughout the country to make those gatherings more practical as educators than they have been in the past. In years gone by the fair that could rival Barnum in the matter of getting up side-show wonders usually scored a financial success, while lamentably lacking in legitimate attractions. The five-legged calf, the two-headed woman and the talking horse were really regarded as being of more importance than the agricultural exhibit, while the inevitable horse-trot was a bit of rural lockeying not equaled outside the antics of the circus. Attractions should, of course, and doubtless will continue, but the main purpose of the county fair ought not to be lost sight of. One of the features of a fair at Huron, Dakota, a few days ago was what was called "Matrimony Day," at which a prize was awarded to the first wedded pair. At Oreans county fair, according to the New York World, a prize of \$50 was given to the girls who in the shortest time provided "the best cooked and most tastefully arranged meal for six persons." Our contemporary says: "No professional cooks were allowed to compete and girls under sixteen were allowed twenty five points. The meal was to consist of broiled beaf-steak, fried chicken, mashed potatoes, baked sweet potatoes, stewed tomatoes, bread and butter, baking-powder biscuit, assorted cake, assorted fruits, appie pie and coffee.
