THE BLECTION IN THIS CITY. Money Was all Powerful in Bringing About the Republican Victory.

The elections of yesterday were among the most exciting held in this city for many years, and the result in the fight for assembly is that Dr. S. T. Davis is re-elected by a majority of 854 over Harry Drachbar, the Democratic candidate. The Republicans carried every ward in the city but the Seventh and Eighth, and all show very large Republican gains. Davis led Beaver in the

city by a considerable vote. It was known for the past few days that the Republican managers were supplied with money which they had in large quantities. The "boodle" was given into the hands of workers of the different wards, many of whom exhibit-ed it upon the streets, and in barrooms stated ed it upon the streets, and in barrooms stated that they were going to elect Pavis at any cost, as they could procure an unlimited amount of money. Dr. Davis himself stated on Monday that he would be elected, cost what it might. On Monday night Senator Don Cameron came to town and told the boys exactly what was expected of them. When the polis opened it was found that every time of the control was expected of them. When the polls opened it was found that every big and little Republican politician in the city and especially those who expect to run for county offices next year were on hand with their coats off and pockets filled with greenbacks. They at once began to buy up the doubtful voters and shaky Democrats. This continued at every voting place during the entire day, and scenes like those of yesterday were never witnessed in this city. No price was too high for a voter, and, although the men who usually vote for money were numerous and in many cases held themselves at high prices they were all bought like sheep. The price paid ranged from a driak at high prices they were all bought like sheep. The price paid ranged from a driak of bad whiskey to a ten dollar note, but vory few were secured for whisky. What they wanted was money, and they were not slow in getting it. Hundreds of men, many of whom are property-holders and considered well-to-do, refused to vote until paid, and the Republicans secured them.

Early in the day it became evident from the reckless expenditure of money by the Republicans they would carry the city, and the result was not a great surprise to the Democrats who knew how affairs were being conducted.

In the county the elections were conducted in the same manner as in town, and money was freely used in order to bring up the majority. Every Republican politician had received his order and all worked hard from the opening to the closing of the polls.

Abe Keiler, who wants to be sheriff next year, was on hand, and during the day he was well bled for money to keep the pot botting. He contributed liberally and actually believes that he will reaps rich harvest at the next primary. Money was lavishly spent in this ward and over \$500 is said to have been given for votes. Several men received as high as \$9 each.

In the Fourth ward, Picayune Johnson, Squire Spurrier, Pete Fordney and others had charge of affairs. The squire had the boodle and his office was the tavorite resort for the bummers all day. Although there was a great deal of bitterness at different voting places during the day, the only disturbance that amounted to a great deal was in the Seventh ward. The leaders here were "Butch "Miller, Jake Price and Bob were "Butch" Miller, Jake Price and Bob McDonnell. They had large quantities of money which they dealt out with liberal band, and their men were thoroughly soaked with whisky which "Butch" had provided the night before.
