### Confederate Testimony.

The New York alderman, who is the second one to be tried for bribery in having sold his vote for the Broadway railroad franchise, has had his fate committed to the hands of a jury which hesitates to convict him, notwithstanding the positive testimony of two of his confederates that he was one of thirteen members of the board who combined together to sell their votes to the highest bidders for city franchises. The hesitation is natural. There bull by the horns. was in this case little, if any evidence to convict, save the testimony of the two confederates who had been promised by the district attorney immunity from prosecution if they told the truth against their fellows. Such a bribe to tell the truth inevitably subjects the witness to the suspicion of testifying to untruth. And here this suspicion had further ground in the fact that these two witnesses both lately, in another inquiry, testified that there had been no such combination or bribery in the passage of the Broadway charter. It required a great deal of nerve for the district attorney to ask for a conviction upon their bare testimony. and his undertaking would be hooted at as silly, but for the nearly universal belief that the votes of the aldermen were bought for the Broadway charter. The circumstances which produce this belief in the community do not afford legal proof to sustain it, but the moral conviction coming from them is strong. The question in this case is whether such usual conviction is justified by the testimony of perjured associates in the crime, who get immunity from its penalties by testifying against their fellows and giving the law its grip upon them. We think that it is very doubtful whether justice should be thus served. The law denies effect to the testimony of a fellow conspirator which is not sustained by other evidence; and that, even when his testimony is not purchased by promise of immumity. Such testimony is not grateful to the idea of justice. It is permitted because otherwise crime would not be uncovered. But it is doubtful whether it would not be better to let it remain concealed than to detect it in such fashion. No witness may be bribed with money; and wherefore, then should one be bribed by release from the penalties of the law. Out of the band of thirteen aldermen, who are said to have united to sell their votes. all but three or four are fled, or dead, or have saved themselves as witnesses. The few that are present and out in the cold, appeared on the stand to testify that they and the prisoner on trial are innocent. Their testimony, given to save themselves from jail, need not be given much weight ; but it caunot be overthrown by the evidence of two associates, who have heretofore sworn to innocence and now swear to guilt under the protecting wing of the district attorney's office.



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

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## Rallway Building in Russia.

In an effort to augment the war scare now epidemic in Europe, a leading Dublin host paper calls attention to the rapid building of railways that has been going on of late in Russia. One line in particular, that which runs from the Black Sea to the Caspian. has been pushed with great energy; and its strategic importance leads to the inference that the Russian government, which controls all the railroads of the empire, is bent on mischief.

There is doubtless an element of pugnacity in all the great enterprises of Russia than that of religion. at the present time, but the true reason for the building of this Caspian line may be found by observing the commercial value of it. The Caspian terminus of the road is to be the port of Baku. Near this city is the famous " field of fire," a broad valley covered with the flame of burning natural gas. Vast quantities of naphtha have always been shipped from this point and of late years the petroleum trade has grown to large proportions, while the city being the ancient port of exchange between India and the West, has so many natural advantages as to make it certain sooner or later to regain that position. The harbor is safe and deep enough to float the largest steamers close to shore, and near by are fishing grounds that have always supported a respectable fishing fleet. The only connextion that this natural commercial centre has with the civilized world is by steamers running to the mouth of the Volga. Almost any enlightened government would long ago have taken measures to insure the building of a railroad from Baku to the Black Sea, for the value of the petroleum and other products of the region would be enough to justify it without the additional inducement of the Indian trade. Americans can appreciate the wealth that lies hidden in the "field of fire," but Russian enterprise has not yet disturbed the Pars who journey from India to worship
