Bids for Taking up the S-inch Water Main-A New Cast Irou Y to be Furnished Thursday afternoon Mayor Morton, the water committee of councils and the superintendent of water works made an official visit to the works and inspected the pumps and machinery.

Too water pumps, which have recently been The water pumps, which have recently been repaired by Mr. Fellembaum, the engineer in charge, were found to be in good working order, as was also the 3,000,000 gailon steam pump. The 6,000,000 steam pump has not been working for some time past owing to a break in the wrought-iron Y with which it is connected to the 24 inch main lead ng to the reservoir. It will be recollected that two or more cast iton Ya. made to connect the the reservoir. It will be recollected that two or more cast from Ys, made to connect the two steam pumps with the 24-inch main were broken, and that a wrought iron Y made of heavy boiler iron was substituted. This also broke some time sgo, and on ex-amination it was found that the boller iron had been raptured, not at the riveled joints, but right through the centre of the iron. The 6,000,000 gailon pump was put out of service, the broken Y was removed and the 5,000,000 gailon pump connected with the main.

Feli Into The Creek.


